W. R. Chambers Dies At 105.

Hitling, Pa., Nov. 28.—W. R. Chambers, perhaps the oldest resident of Pennsylvania, is dead at his home in Cecil, Washington county. Mr. Chambers was 105 years old and at the time of his death was in full possession of all his faculties. His death was due to the infirmities of old age. He was born at Derby, Ireland, and came to this country forty-nine years ago. In addition to leaving a sister in Ireland, who is 103 years old, Mr. Chambers is survived by two sons and one daughter, each of whom is over seventy years old, and by more than a hundred descendants.

DIocese of Ontario. Summary of the Meetings of the Committees.

GOOD SUM EXPENDED IN IMPROVING THE CITY BUILDINGS.

The Same Amount Should Be Spent Each Year For Five Years—The Question of Improved Street Lighting.

At the city property committee meeting yesterday afternoon were Aldermen Aggrove (chairman), Douglas, Couper and Free.

Action on the application of the Kingston township fair association for use of the local exhibition grounds was deferred until the committee is in possession of full information concerning its right to let the grounds. The by-law which was introduced was reported that the committee had a balance of \$100 at this date, and it was decided to expend it in further repairs to the city buildings. Some more painting will be done to the walls outside, and some painting on inside woodwork. By the end of the year the committee will have expended \$1,000 in improving the city buildings. A like amount was expended each year for the next five years the buildings will be in a very fair condition. The property committee, under the chairmanship of Ald. Aggrove, has done good work.

Improved Street Lighting.

The report of J. M. Campbell upon the cost of installing new and improved arc lamps for street lighting was prepared at the request of Ald. Toye, chairman of the light, heat and power committee, who wished to give more attention to this matter before his term of office expired, as his time next year will have to be devoted to his duties as a member of the city council. His object is to submit to the people the question as to whether they wish to expend \$15,000 or less in improving the street lighting, which was touched by the general extension by-law because of the anticipated perfection of new arc lights that would revolutionize street lighting. When the matter has been considered by the city council a by-law will, no doubt, be submitted to the people for them to say whether a further expenditure will be made in street lighting improvements. The cost will not be met by the plant's revenue; it taken out of the city's revenue; in the meantime Mr. Campbell will go fully into the matter with the light committee.

Is Aid. Ross Meant?

The Kingston News, in an article on warmer clothing for firemen, concludes: "The treatment is obviously unfair, and the aldermen who are looking for re-election next year would increase their popularity greatly by pushing the matter." Ald. Ross, candidate for the mayoralty, is chairman of the committee in charge of the firemen.

SOLDIERS LIKED HIM.

General Colville was Popular Among the Troops.

London, Nov. 26.—The death by accident of Gen. Colville is much mourned in military circles.

The dead soldier was a great favorite. He was one of those who made the saying apt that "Soldiers love the graveyard of military reputation."

Known as a gallant officer, who had seen service in many lands, his appointment to succeed the ill-fated Gen. Methuen was hailed with acclaim in all England. Soon, however, he was sent home by Lord Roberts, charged with inefficiency in the field.

A demand was made in the House of Commons for an inquiry. Secretary of War Broderick replied that it compelled him to say things that he would prefer to leave unsaid, but he would tell the whole truth.

"At Sanna's Post," said the secretary, "Gen. Colville blundered or manoeuvred about until his force was weary, while the Boers carried off guns unopposed. Lord Roberts thought Col. Broadwood did right, although Gen. Colville left Col. Broadwood and his shattered force severely alone and marched his troops in another direction. He showed a lack of attention which lost him the confidence of Lord Roberts. Lord Roberts, however, postponed his decision until he could be fully informed. Then came the unfortunate Lindley surrender, for which Gen. Colville was blameable, as he ought to have attempted to effect relief."

"I consulted Lord Roberts regarding the Gibraltar command, and I had no alternative after the advice from Lord Roberts and Sir Evelyn Wood. I gave Gen. Colville an opportunity to resign, but he insisted upon being removed. I consider Gen. Colville has been treated more leniently than if he had been court-martialed. Every possible pressure has been brought to bear in his favor, but as long as I hold office I shall not give way to clamor."

HEARD IN BELLEVILLE.

Action Against George McGowan Dismissed.

Belleville, Ontario. Forward by McEwan—The plaintiff in this action is a cigar manufacturer in Belleville, and the defendant a cigar manufacturer in Kingston. In 1900 the plaintiff purchased the cigar-making plant of one Johnson, and began the business of cigar manufacturing at Belleville, which was carried on until 1903, when the defendant joined the plaintiff in a joint stock company, the plaintiff contending that the stock in trade and plant used by him were put into the defendant's company upon the agreement that he was to have stock in the defendant's company for the value thereof; that after any he was to have an increase of salary from \$16 a week to \$20 or \$25 a week as well as a share in the profits. The defendant contended that the business and plant in Belleville was always the plaintiff's own business and that plaintiff was merely a manager for his services. The action was for the recovery of the balance of wages and profits claimed to be due to the plaintiff. Judgment dismissing the plaintiff's action with costs.
