NEW CHINESE DIFFICULTY.
The Chinese question is assuming a
new phase in British Columbia. The
head tax is \$500, but students are
exempt from the impost, and they
have eighteen months in which to
make clear their status. It is charged
that the youthful Chinamen are pay-
ing the head tax, then applying for ad-
mission to the schools, learning all
they can of English and at the same
time working overtime and qualifying
for citizenship. The theory is that
there is an undue number of Chinese
students, and that they are students
simply in order to circumvent the
law, secure a status in the country,
and a return of their money. Some
of the Chinese youths have been de-
nied admission to the schools, and
the first thing the people know they
will have a repetition of the San Fran-
cisco experience under more aggravat-
ing circumstances. Appeal has been
made to Ottawa for a reading of the
law in question, and it has been con-
tended that the youths were not "stu-
dents" within the meaning of the act.
The courts may have to settle the is-
sue financially, but in the meantime
the federal government reminds the
local government that it is not sup-
porting financially since it receives one-
half of the sum collected in head tax.

THE TORONTO-OTTAWA LINE.
The Recorder is anxious that the
Grand Trunk shall reconstruct the road
between Brockville and Ottawa, take
the kinks out of it, and reduce the dis-
tance from seventy-four to about fifty
miles. It says that a charter for this
shorter and more direct route has
long been in existence, and that it
should be revived now rather than
that a line should be built between
Ottawa and Kingston.
There is reason to believe that a
direct connection with the capital is
under contemplation, and the maps
which have been printed show that it
will shorten the trip between Toronto
and Ottawa very materially. At present
one has to go via the C.P.R. (one
train a day), or make the round
about tour, via Brockville, and spend,
as the Recorder admits, about three
hours in making a run which should
not occupy more than an hour.
One does not wish Brockville any
disappointment, but he can see that the
Toronto-Ottawa railway, under
Grand Trunk auspices, via Kingston,
would offer a route and a speedy con-
nection which cannot be too highly
valued. The local loop line has been
under consideration, and later infor-
mation is to the effect that the engi-
neering difficulties heretofore encoun-
tered have been about overcome.

MOTHERS' COOKING CLASS.
The proposal that a mothers' class
in cooking be established in connec-
tion with the school department of
domestic science has been revived by
the visit to the city of Inspector
Leake, of the education department.
Mr. Leake is a man of marked ability.
He received his technical training in
England, but coming to Canada
while still a young man, entered into
the service of the people as a teacher
of manual training.
In due time the government decided
that it should have an expert who
would act in a dual capacity, as ad-
viser to the department and adviser
of the school boards which were in-
terested in technical training. When
asked what he thought of our domes-
tic science department he spoke most
encouragingly of it. The equipment
was quite satisfactory and the work
of the teacher all that could be de-
sired. When the mothers' class was
mentioned he gave it his warmest en-
couragement, saying that it would
help to enlarge the interest in the
school and give practical effect to its
teaching.
Brockville has a mothers' class in
connection with its domestic science
class. There was a loud and urgent
demand for it, and when it was finally
accorded to there were more appli-
cants than can be accommodated.
This experience, and Inspector Leake's
approval, should warrant the com-
mittee of management in opening an
adult class in Kingston with the new
year.

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST MINING REGULATIONS.**
COAL—Coal mining rights may be
leased for a period of twenty-one years
at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not
less than 2,500 acres shall be leased to
one individual or company. A royalty at
the rate of five cents per ton shall be
collected on the merchantable coal mined.
QUARTZ—A person eighteen years of
age or over, having discovered mineral
places, may locate a claim 1,500x1,500
feet.
The fee for recording a claim is \$5.
At least \$100 must be expended on the
claim each year or part to the value of
recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has
been expended, the locator may, upon
having a survey made, and upon
complying with other requirements, pur-
chase the land at \$1 per acre.
The patent provides for the payment
of a royalty of 2 1/2 per cent on the sales.
Fluorite mining claims generally are 100
feet square; entry fee \$5, renewable year-
ly.
An applicant may obtain two leases to
drill for gold of five miles each for a
term of twenty years, renewable at the
discretion of the Minister of the In-
terior.
The lease shall have a drudge in opera-
tion within one month from the date
