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WHAT MAY HAPPEN

"TICK" KILLS PARTRIDGE, STATE DEPOPULATED. Legislation is Sought to Bring About Close Season of at Least Two Years. Albany, N.Y., Nov. 28.—Commissioner J. S. Whipple of the state forest, fish and game department announced that an effort is to be made at the coming session of the legislature to secure legislation to bring about a close season for partridges for at least two years.

WILL NOT BE CHAPLAIN. Rev. O. Darwin to Remain as Missionary Superintendent. Toronto, Nov. 28.—Rev. Oliver Darwin, superintendent of Methodist missions for Saskatchewan conference, who tendered his resignation some time ago to accept the chaplaincy of Stony Mountain penitentiary, will not change his work.

Fohn Winds. The Journal of the Meteorological Society of Japan contains an account by Dr. Okada, of those remarkable winds, known as Fohn winds, which have been called Fohn winds. The winds to which this name was originally given are warm and blowing down from the snow-capped mountains of Switzerland and producing extensive melting of the snow. They have been called "snow eaters." The Fohn is essentially a phenomenon of mountainous regions, and Wonsan, in Korea, where they have been observed is surrounded except on the east by high mountains.

DESTROYED FAMOUS FRESCO. Revenge, Not Accident, Believed to Explain Damage. Rome, Nov. 28.—Workingmen employed upon the electric lights in the palace of the banker Vicenza have irreparably damaged Angelo Rusato's celebrated fresco. The plaster has been scratched and peeled away by ladders that were placed against the walls and otherwise defaced and broken by nails.

WILL SHUT OUT MORMONS. Hamburg, Nov. 28.—The police of this city have been informed that thirty-seven Mormon missionaries, called from Boston, the Cynric recently, with the intention of proselytizing in Germany. It has been decided that any German subjects among these missionaries will be allowed into the country, but the others will be refused admittance.



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ANDREW CARNEGIE

Began Fortune Along With Water-town N.Y. Man. Watertown N.Y. Standard. Three score and ten years ago Andrew Carnegie, who has since become world-famous as an ironmaster, philanthropist, and advocate of universal peace, was born in the little town of Dunfermline, Scotland. The future capitalist came with his parents to this country in 1848, when eleven years of age. His first employment was as a weaver's assistant in a cotton factory at Allegheny, Penn. Later he donned the blue uniform of a messenger boy in Pittsburgh, a city which he has since remembered largely through his benefactions. He improved his spare moments as a messenger in the service of the Ohio Telegraph company in learning telegraphy, and entered the



employment of the Pennsylvania railroad, advancing by promotion until he became superintendent of the Pittsburgh division of the system. He gained the nucleus of his fortune through his association with Theodore T. Woodruff, inventor of the sleeping car, in the organization of the Central Transportation company along with Thomas A. Scott and Edgar Thompson, of Pittsburgh, who aside from the inventor were the first to appreciate the utility of the sleeping car. During the civil war, Mr. Carnegie served as superintendent of the military railroads and telegraph lines in the east. After the war was over he engaged in the iron industry, with which his name has since been inseparably connected. In 1891 he merged his great steel interests with the



SHAW FOR PRESIDENCY. Conservative Treatment of Corporation Questions. Chicago, Ill., Nov. 28.—Leslie M. Shaw, secretary of the treasury, at a banquet of the National Business League, practically announced his candidacy for the presidency on a platform of conservative treatment of corporation questions. While commending Roosevelt in general terms, he said: "It will take years to outgrow the evil effects resulting from the agitation, reckless legislation and ill-considered prosecutions by those who have been unable to appreciate the president's purpose." Mr. Shaw declared for more elastic currency, and suggested a system by which banks could issue additional currency, subject to a five per cent. tax.

WANTED AT OTTAWA

ARRESTED AT THE SOO FOR BIGAMY. Other Serious Charges May Be Preferred Against the Fashionably Dressed Man. Sault Ste. Marie, Nov. 26.—Police Capt. Henry Coulter arrested J. F. Lavigne, or Lange, at the Fountain House, Michigan Soo, last night. He was turned over to Chief of Police Downey of the Canadian Soo, and will be sent to Ottawa to answer a charge of bigamy. Local officers were notified of the case by Chief of Police S. E. DeLarouche, Ottawa, and the man was identified from a picture. It is also believed by the police that he was connected with a diamond robbery in New York city recently.

When taken to police headquarters he was attired in ultra-fashionable wearing apparel and appeared to be a man of prosperity. He promptly asserted his innocence and demanded a lawyer. The police ransacked his pockets and brought to light forty-five cents, which, so far as they were able to learn, was all the money he had. Chief Swart told him he intended to notify the police of New York of his arrest and he then consented to go to the Canadian Soo.

Chief Swart received a telegram this afternoon from the chief of police at Ottawa, concerning the prisoner. The message said his name was Lavigne. He requested that the prisoner be asked whether he would come to Canada without legal proceedings being instituted, or prefer to go to Oranienburg, N.Y., or New York city. From this it is believed the charges in New York state, alleged to have been made against the man, are of a serious nature.
