THE CHARGE OF INTIMIDATION CONSIDERED.

At the Police Court This Morning—The Evidence Given By the Various Parties Interested.

The police court was crowded to the doors on Thursday morning, when the case against the two striking tailors, George Leader and William J. Robinson, charged by John Martin, employed by Crawford & Walsh, with intimidation, was called. The charge against the two men was that they did, on November 25th, make threats of violence against Martin with the intention of doing him bodily harm, and keeping him from his work. Both entered a plea of "not guilty." T. J. Rigney appeared for the strikers, and A. B. Cunningham acted for the prosecutors.

John Martin was called, and to Mr. Cunningham, stated that on November 25th, he was ill and did not work. At six o'clock in the evening, when witness was on Bagot street, he said that Leader and Robinson came up to him. One of them said to him, "You insulted two of our girls." Continuing, witness said that the accused said, "you are scabs, if you don't get out of town, we'll kill you." Witness said that he had to promise to see the men again in the morning. This was all that happened on that night.

Witness went on to say about what happened the next day, but Mr. Rigney objected. Mr. Cunningham said that he wished to show that an attempt had been made to give one of the men money to get out of the city. He would submit evidence to show that one of the men had given money, and a railway ticket. His witness said that this should not be submitted just now, and Mr. Cunningham consented to bring up the matter later on.

Questioned by Mr. Rigney, witness said that his home was in England, and that he had been working for Crawford & Walsh four weeks. "Have you met any part of your story?" asked Mr. Rigney. "I have told all," said the witness, "except about them sending my brother away."

"Did you ask for any inducement to leave?"

"No, I did not."

Witness further stated that one of the men offered him \$5 and a railway ticket to leave the city. Witness said that he had been living at 279 Bagot street.

Witness said that he was in the company of his brother and brother-in-law, when the strikers stopped him. He was with them about half an hour, and one of the strikers threatened to strike him.

"Were you afraid?" asked Mr. Rigney.

"No, I could look after myself."

Witness said that one of the strikers accused him of assaulting two girls, and further, stated that he had a warrant for his arrest. Witness and his brother-in-law went to the junction to see his brother off, and when there, the strikers offered witness and his brother-in-law \$5 each, if they would leave town.

Samuel Litwin, brother-in-law of the previous witness, gave evidence. He said that Robinson took hold of his shoulder and told him if he would not leave town, he would kill him. The strikers also called him a "scab."

To Mr. Rigney, witness said that he had an appointment with the strikers, but did not keep it, because of this. He threatened him and asked him to leave town, offering to pay his railway fare. He said that he could not leave, as he was married.

"Were you frightened?" asked Mr. Rigney.

"Yes, I was," replied the witness, "but I would not have been frightened if I had not been married."

This statement caused the court to smile.

"The responsibilities of married life made me nervous," said Mr. Rigney, with a smile.

At this stage of the proceedings, Mr. Cunningham asked that the charge against the strikers be amended, charging them with following the plaintiff on Bagot street, in a disorderly manner, and that they were guilty of intimidation.

The magistrate consented to the amendment, but Mr. Rigney announced that he would not plead to the charge as amended, unless he was given the section under which the amendment was made. This was given, and Mr. Rigney entered a plea of "not guilty."

Freston North, Division street, one of the striking tailors, said that about 6:20 p.m., on Monday, November 25th, he had a conversation on Bagot street with Martin and Litwin, about two girls being insulted. He asked them if they were the guilty parties, and they said that they were not. The conversation then went on about the strike, and Litwin asked to be given \$10 to leave for Montreal. Martin said that he was going to stay in the city, but that he was not going to work at the tailoring. Witness was not with Leader and Robinson when the latter met Martin and Litwin.

Witness said that an appointment was made for Litwin to receive money to leave town. Litwin appeared to be well satisfied and there was no ill-feeling between any of the parties.

William J. Robinson was then called. He said that at a meeting of the tailors held on Monday afternoon, two girls, members of the union, reported that they had been insulted by two men, employed by Crawford & Walsh. On Monday night witness and Leader met Martin and Litwin, and witness asked Martin if he was the man who

MARINE NEWS

The Items Gathered About the Harbour.

The schooner Tradewind passed down yesterday on her way from Deseronto to Gannanque, with a cargo of slabs. The steamer George Navarro is expected at Richardson's to-morrow from Montreal, with freight. This will probably be her last trip of the season.

Swift's Steamer Bickerdike, due to-day from the coast, steamer Aletha, from Bay points; schooner Lizzie Metzner, cleared for Brockville to unload the balance of her cargo of canned goods, from South Bay.

The M. T. Co. has now only one steamer, the Advance, to arrive with grain from Fort William. The vessel is due here early next week, and this will be the wind up. Last year the last trip of the season was made by the steamer Westmount and Fairmount, which arrived on Dec. 8th. This year the closing may possibly be a little earlier, but not much earlier, at any rate.

The S.S. Midland King, one of the largest steel boats afloat in the Canadian fleet, has arrived at Port Stanley with 135,000 bushels of wheat. Thirty-five thousand bushels were consigned to the John Campbell Milling Co., St. Thomas, and the balance for Kingston. The Midland King is 400 feet long, was built on the Clyde, Glasgow, Scotland, and is owned by the Collingwood Navigation Company.
