THE BOARD OF WORKS

ASKED TO PAY GENERAL DAMAGE CLAIMS.

Extent of Walks Laid During the Year—Board to Urge Ratepayers to Vote for Road Improvement By-Law.

The Board of Works had a meeting yesterday afternoon. Members present were Aldermen Gaskin (chairman), Kent, Free, McCann and Hanley.

The city engineer reported that there had been five and one-half miles of concrete walks laid during the year, as against six and one-eighth miles in 1906.

Ald. Kent asked if the board intended to have the breakwater explained in the rubric that had been put upon it last spring.

A communication was read from Mary J. Brown, 16 Marston street, asking the city to pay \$50 for damage done to trees in front of her house on Halloween night.

Michael P. Ryan, on behalf of the Wolfe Island syndicate, which owns a service station, wrote asking for \$100 damages for injuries sustained by the animal in getting into an alleged open excavation on Johnston street last summer.

Charles Purdy, blacksmith, asked for compensation for financial loss caused him owing to the construction of the Queen street sewer, which, for a long time, prohibited entrance to his premises.

Ald. Gaskin brought up the question of the road improvement by-law. The people are to be asked to vote \$12,000 to be raised by debentures, and it was advisable, the chairman said, to put the matter before the ratepayers in a clear way.

On motion of Ald. Kent it was decided to recommend to the council that the board of works be empowered to lay the matter before the people by advertising in the press, and how why the by-law should be carried.

The report of J. M. Campbell stating that electrical power for the stone crusher could be supplied at the rate of four cents a kilo-watt hour was read.

The matter of calling for tenders for the necessary road plant was left to the chairman and the city engineer. The plant will cost about \$7,000.
