**QUEEN'S HOCKEY PLAYERS
 IN NEW YORK.**

A Negro Barred From the American
 Athletic Union—Canadian
 Unions Sink Their Differences.

There appears to have been a slight
 mix-up, regarding the score in Mon-
 treal-Peterboro game. The score given
 out at the time was 71 to 9 in favor
 of Montreal. Now it is stated that
 each side should have an extra point,
 so the score should be 72 to 10. But
 what does it matter?

The annual meeting of the Federal
 Hockey League will be held in Mon-
 treal on Saturday, December 7th. It
 looks as if this league would, this
 year, include teams from Smith's
 Falls, Brockville and Cornwall, the
 Ottawa Victorias, a team from Mon-
 treal, and perhaps Morrisburg.

By their victory of 16 to 0 over
 the Varsity juniors Saturday the
 Parahale Canon club of Montreal, who
 they are one of the best junior out-
 fits Canada has seen in some years.
 The O.R.F.U. junior champions had a
 shade the better of the intercollegiate
 junior champions at Kingston play
 and at all stages of the game.

Toronto Telegram: That proposition
 to hold a C.A.A.U. meet in New
 York seems strangely flavored with
 the money at stake. The C.A.A.U. it
 seems like that to the C.A.A.U. and it
 is not likely the latter will either
 undertake such a thing itself or give
 anyone else a permit to do so. It
 seems some enterprising Yankee sent
 along the proposition to Tom Flanagan.
 That's where it all started—
 and where it will all end.

Sinking their differences for the benefit
 of Canada in its representation at
 the world's championship athletic
 meet in London, next summer, the
 Canadian Amateur Athletic Union and
 the Amateur Athletic Federation of
 Canada have patched up a truce un-
 der the Dominion over the Olympic
 games, leaving this country uninter-
 ferred in the selection of the athletes it
 will send abroad to compete for the
 honor of Canada and the Olympic
 With five teams in the Amateur Hockey
 League of New York, this year,
 instead of four last season, the St.
 Nicholas rink will be the scene of
 many a hard fought battle in the
 schedule of twenty games which will
 be played. All the games are played
 on St. Nicholas rink, which is situated
 at the corner of Sixty-sixth street
 and Broadway. In addition to the
 league games, Yale, Princeton Colum-
 bia, and occasionally Dartmouth and
 Harvard play out their intercollegiate
 schedule in this rink.

Just because he is a negro and be-
 cause certain southern object to

 been much talk through the A.A.U. coun-

 phy get final answer from the black-
 and-white defender, stating that he
 had decided to join Wanderers when
 the cup holders journeyed west, and
 would play with them throughout the
 season. Ross has developed into a
 great player and will help to fill up
 the gap left by the late Hod Stuart
 and Lester Patrick, of Wanderers.

Toronto Star: The New York Ath-
 letic Club's team looks very much like
 an All-Canadian intercollegiate team.
 Starting with Dr. "Dick" Mills, the
 former Queen's University player, for
 goal; then comes "Short" F. C.
 Broadfoot, an ex-captain of Toronto
 University, for cover-point; Dr. Bruce
 Sutherland, who played right wing
 for Queen's University, will play the
 same position for the winged-foot
 team. Dr. "Banty" Dalton, the old
 Queen's University centre, is also out
 again this year with the New York A. C.
 On the left wing is Dillabaugh, of
 Morrisburg, who played with the Tor-
 onto University team in 1903. Dilla-
 baugh played last year with the New
 York team. For point the most like-
 ly player is Brophy, formerly of Mon-
 treal.

TRAITOR CONFESSES GUILT.

**Plans of Toulon Harbor Offered
 For Sale.**

Paris, Dec. 3.—Ulmo, the naval sub-
 lieutenant, who was arrested some
 time ago at Toulon, after he had dis-
 covered to self government plans of
 the harbor defences, which he was
 alleged to have stolen, has made a
 full confession of his crime to the ex-
 amining magistrate in Paris. He now
 admits that he was in communication
 with an agent of the German espionage
 department, and had offered him
 the stolen documents for \$150,000.
 The agent considered the price too
 high, so the negotiations fell through.
 When Ulmo's house was searched,
 the police found three telegrams which
 the German agent had addressed to
 him. One of these said that "the
 price asked for the goods was too
 dear." The original telegram which
 Ulmo sent offering to sell the docu-
 ments was also traced by the au-
 thorities. It was in a disguised hand-
 writing, and did not contain the name
 and address of the sender. Unluckily
 for the traitor, at the last moment, he
 decided to alter a word in the mes-
 sage. As erasures have to be signed,
 Ulmo, forgetting the part he was
 playing, employed his ordinary hand-
 writing, and put his initials at the
 foot of the message.

At the conclusion of his examina-
 tion he faintly, and a doctor had to
 be sent for in order to revive him.
 A Paris newspaper stated, to-day,
 that Rear Admiral Siegel, ex-German
 naval attaché in Paris, who has just
 been recalled, was mixed up in the
 Ulmo affair, and that it was to him
 that Ulmo offered to sell the papers.
 On enquiry at the foreign office this
 evening it was learned that there was
 no foundation for the statement that
 Admiral Siegel had been implicated in
 any affair of espionage in France.

LOCAL GRAIN RECORD.

The amount of grain re-
 ceived at Kingston from the
 west during the season
 just closing constitutes a
 record figure. Up to Dec.
 1st, there had been re-
 ceived here, 15,723,526 bush-
 els of grain, that had
 passed through the Welland
 Canal. Of this amount,
 15,036,602 bushels had been
 shipped in river barges
 down the St. Lawrence to
 Montreal. Several more
 cargoes are due this week,
 so that the total amount
 of grain receipts for the
 season will be over sixteen
 million bushels. Last year,
 the total amount received
 was 12,165,460, so that
 the increase this year is
 one-third. That Kingston
 is becoming more impor-
 tant as a trans-shipment
 point is very evident.

The amount of coal re-
 ceived here up to Dec. 1st,
 was 52,280 tons, or an in-
 crease of 11,140 tons over
 the total of last year.

RECORD PRICES GIVEN.

**Historic Letters at Sale By
 Auction.**

London, Dec. 3.—A collection of in-
 teresting autograph letters came under
 the hammer at Messrs. Sotheby's, in-
 cluding many rare letters from royal
 personages, a series from Thackeray,
 Dickens, Disraeli and others, to the
 famous Lord Byron, who was in
 charge of Lord Byron's schooner, the
 Bolivar.

These letters, too, had additional in-
 terest, owing to the fact that none of
 them had been in Mr. Prothero's edi-
 tion of Lord Byron. For these seven
 letters a total of \$430 was secured,
 the purchasers being Mr. Pearson and
 Mr. Magee.

An especially noteworthy item was a
 holograph letter signed by King
 Charles I. addressed to the Elector
 Palatine, which Mr. Brown, who had
 bought it from Edinburgh, carried
 off for \$250.

The day's total amounted to close
 on \$5,500.

ILLICIT WORK ENDED.

**Smuggler Poses As Frontier
 Guard.**

Vienna, Dec. 3.—Josef Gunther, a
 Bohemian smuggler, has been arrested
 on the Austro-Russian frontier in the
 uniform of an Austrian frontier guard.
 He confessed that after suffering
 much at the hands of the frontier
 guards in his own smuggling career,
 he had adopted their uniform to har-
 vest other smugglers. He had caught
 twenty-six during six months, and
 had confiscated their goods as the
 price of giving them their liberty.
 In this way he had made a hand-
 some income. His career as an am-
 ateur gendarme was closed when he
 met a party of the real frontier
 guards, who recognized him in spite
 of his uniform, and made him prisoner.

**Clever Relic Swindle Discovered
 By Wisconsin Collector.**

An alleged copy of Noah's diary
 upon a copper tablet dug up in Michi-
 gan and offered for sale to a Wiscon-
 sin collector has resulted in uncover-
 ing one of the cleverest relic swindles
 of recent years.

Michigan copper formed the basis of
 the enterprise, which consisted in
 manufacturing ancient relics out of
 copper, painting them green to rep-
 resent verdigris, dipping them in cor-
 rosive acid and burying them in mounds
 after which they were dug up by relic
 hunting expeditions under the leader-
 ship of the promoters. The affidavits
 of prominent citizens that they had
 seen the relics dug out of the ground
 were sufficient to obtain their sale to
 credulous collectors. As a finishing
 touch to a gigantic swindle the relic
 manufacturers latched on from In-
 dian relics. The diary of Noah was
 offered to a wealthy man of Wiscon-
 sin, who asked the advice of a muse-
 um curator. The sale still hangs
 fire.
