Synopsis of Canadian Northwest HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Domin-on Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more

Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency. Entry by proxy may, however, be mad at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughten brother or sister of an intending homesteader. An application for entry or cancellation made personally at any sub-agent's tion made personally at any sub-agent's Sub-agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by

In case of "personation" or fraud the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim or if entry has been granted it will be summarily cancelled. An application for cancellation must be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for cancellation will be received from an individual until that apdication has been disposed of. Where an entry is cancelled subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for cancellation will be en-Applicant for cancellation must state in what particulars the homesteader is it

subject of cancellation proceedings may subject to the approval of Depart-ment, relinquish it in favor of father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister if eligible, but to no one else, on filing declaration of abandonment. DUTIES-A settler is required to per-form the duties under one of the following plans :(1) At least six months' residence up-

on and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned colely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of hi homestead. Joint ownership in land wil not meet this requirement.

(3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinistead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the fath-

er (or mother.) (4) The term "visinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowance crossed in the measurement. (5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such Before making application for patent the settler must give six months notice in writing to the Commissioner of Do-

Not more than 2,560 acres shall be leased to one individual or company. A royalty at the rate of five cents per ton shall be collected on the merchantable coal mined QUARTZ—A person eighteen years of age or over, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1,500x1,500

The fee for recording a claim is \$5. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per acre.


