BIGAMY IS ARRESTED

Charles Shaw Deserted His Wife and Babies And Married Miss Ethel Watkins of Montreal Street--He Was Arrested Last Night by the Police.

Married and arrested for wife desertion in twenty-four hours, is the record of Charles Shaw, Montreal street, who now lies in the cells at the police station, awaiting trial. This is not the only charge that he will be laid against him, as he will be charged with bigamy. Shaw has a wife and two young ones living on Montreal street, and on Tuesday evening was married to a Kingston girl, who he had deceived into believing that he was a single man.

The accused came here from Hamilton, last spring, before which he had been married to Miss Margaret Gascoyne, a former Kingstonian, and niece of Mrs. Truman Potter, Montreal street. She is the mother of two sons, one seventeen months old and the other four weeks.

Shaw, who possessed good references and seemed to be a steady man, had been employed by the street railway company as motorman and night watchman up to Tuesday morning last, when he was discharged for being asleep on duty.

Married Tuesday Evening. His wife and children have been living with Mrs. Potter for some weeks, and the wife had no suspicion that anything wrong was going on. During the summer Shaw made the acquaintance of Miss Ethel Watkins, daughter of William Watkins, 112 Montreal street, to whom he presented himself as a single man. He paid the young lady every attention during the summer and fall, proposed to her and was accepted. They were married at eight o'clock on Tuesday evening by Rev. Charles A. Sykes, pastor of St. Stephen's Street Methodist church, in the presence of the bride's sister, Miss Hattie Watkins, who acted as bridesmaid, and Walter Francisco, who was best man.

Shaw's actions in deserting his wife and two small children, leaving them penniless and dependent on friends, were a great surprise to all who knew him, but nevertheless showed that he had his plan well thought out. He had everything in readiness to leave town and would likely have done so last evening had the police not arrested him. The last time the mother of his two children saw him was at seven o'clock, Tuesday, when he came to Mr. Potter's and told her that he had secured a position in Belleville and had to leave at once. The wife trusting in his story, accompanied him to the train, and instead of going to Belleville he jumped off shortly after the train had started, came back into the city and was married to the girl whose life and name he was ruining. When he left his wife at the station he tearfully kissed her goodbye, saying he would send for her as soon as he got settled. He left her with only twenty cents, while he carried away twenty-seven dollars in his pocket. When he was arrested he had seven dollars and seventy-five cents on him.

Scene At The Homes. The scene at the home of the real wife, when she was informed of her husband's unfaithfulness, was most pitiful. It was some moments before she could grasp what the words meant when she burst into tears and fell in a faint. She begged her uncle not to have her husband arrested, not to touch him or her babies' sake. Relations of Mrs. Shaw said that she has been anything but well treated since she married him.

DR. PYNE CENSURED

For Issuing Mandate to the Kingston School Board. He Demands Removal of Collegiate Teachers--The Minister of Education Given a Drubbing by Conservative Trustee.

The Board of Education had a special session last evening, to consider the request of Queen's University that four of the Collegiate Institute teachers, who are rated in Class II as instructors, be replaced by Class I men, in order to comply with the demands of the Ontario Educational department in connection with the faculty of pedagogy, whose attendance at the work that he requires. Had there been no faculty of pedagogy established at Queen's, their fitness would never have been questioned. Those points were forcibly brought out in the discomfiture of the trustees in the question, so that their reputation might not suffer by the necessity of their replacement.

What the board had before it was the report of the management committee which recommended that it was inexpedient to make any changes in the Collegiate staff in the middle of the school year, as the institute had suffered more than once by similar changes in the past.

Since the management committee had, however, now issued an opinion, Dean Lovell was present and announced that Queen's University would guarantee the salaries of the teachers up to July 1st next, and help them to secure other appointments, so that they would not suffer. It would also pay any increases necessary to new teachers.

Edward Bennett declared that he would stand for such a hold-up. He vigorously assailed the minister of education for saying indirectly, that if the board didn't dismiss certain teachers, Queen's couldn't get the pedagogy grant. The sooner such charges were made public, the better.

The Policy Pursued by Immigrants--They Preferred the City--The Country is the Place For Their Services. According to all reports, there will be a number of unemployed in the city this winter, and the question is one that is causing a great deal of discussion.

Journalists' Remembrance. H. R. Charlton, of the Grand Trunk railway system, was agreeably surprised by a receipt from London, England, of a beautiful sterling silver cigar box, sent by the last party of British journalists (representing several financial journals), who recently visited Ontario for the purpose of investigating the mineral sections of that province. The box is a very handsome one, and the lid bears the following inscription: "To Harry R. Charlton, a souvenir of a pleasant pilgrimage through the province of Ontario, September, 1907." Then follow the names of the sixteen representatives and their papers, who made up the party. Mr. Charlton accompanied these gentlemen throughout their entire tour while they were in Canada.
