All the Montreal officials were down and many speeches were made before the leave-taking. The Montreal president, Dr. Irvine, voiced the sentiments of the club in saying that the players were exceedingly sorry at having to lose Elliott, even though it was only for a year.

A TEMPERANCE WORKER.

Miss Jameson is Intensely in Earnest.

On Wednesday evening Miss Jameson, of the Rochester W.C.T.U., gave an interesting address, on temperance, in Queen's street Methodist church Sunday school. The speaker dwelt on the advance of the temperance movement in England, Ireland, Scotland, and the United States, and stated that in every community where the W.C.T.U. is situated, she found women a great aid in the movement, and power in the community, against the use and sale of liquor.

The main part of her address dwelt with temperance in connection with religion. She said that the barrooms should be done away with, but the only way to stop the traffic was through religious principles. She also mentioned a story of a young people and children, telling parents and guardians to be sure to guard and keep them from the use of intoxicants.

Miss Jameson has travelled all over the world in the interest of temperance, and her earnestness is intense. She gave another lecture in the First Congregational church, last evening, and, to-night, will address the members of the W.C.T.U. at the George Mills, University avenue. Her address, last evening, was on the "Indwelling of the Holy Ghost."

CAME TO SEE HIM.

Unusual Scene in Police Cells To-day.

A rather unusual scene was enacted in the police cells, this morning, at the close of the case of Charles Sheary, sentenced to one year in the Central Prison, for bigamy. A small deputation, including wife No. 1 and No. 2, a relative of wife No. 2, and a young man who was best man at the wedding on Tuesday night, were allowed in to see the prisoner. As soon as the party was led into the long corridor, wife No. 1 and No. 2 burst into tears, and the latter cried out, "Oh, Charles, why do you do me a wrong?"

The other members looked on rather sadly all the while, and the scene was a most pitiable one. The prisoner's eyes were wet with tears, but he had no explanation to make for his conduct, and the deputation withdrew in a very few minutes. Both women shook hands with him.

PAUL REVERE'S RIDE.

Dramatic and Historical Picture at The Bijou.

Paul Revere, the man whom the Revere House in Kingston, is named after, will enact his great historical "ride" at the Bijou, to-day and to-morrow, accompanied on the gramophone by Richard Wagner's terrible musical composition, "The Ride of the Valkyrie."

Revere rode from Boston to Concord on the night of April 18th, 1775, to warn the minute men of the advance of the British force sent by General Gage. The picture shows the American "committee of safety" in consultation with General Warren at the Green Dragon Inn. It is a thrilling presentation of the many scenes.

HE IS BUBBLING.

Yeast Solution Runs Through Russian's Veins.

Chicago, Dec. 6.—Yeast germs in the blood have been found to be the strange affliction of Leo Konnel, who is confined in the Cook County Hospital, and for whose recovery there is said to be no hope. It is supposed that the infection entered his system through some slight lesion in the skin of his hands or face. The blood furnished an ideal condition for the reproduction of these germs, and they multiplied at an enormous rate, so that now a yeast solution is running through Konnel's veins.

SHOOT SEVEN PERSONS.

Finally Corralled and Put to Death By Snake.

Augusta, Ark., Dec. 6.—Crazed by cocaine, Wash Mussy, a negro, ran amuck, shooting seven white persons, two of whom were women. The negro was finally corralled in the railroad yard and shot to death by a posse, fighting until he fell, literally riddled with bullets. One of Mussy's victims will die.

FATHER GETS DAMAGES

FOR CHILD BURNT IN HOCHELAGA FIRE.

School Commissioners Must Pay Him \$300—His Action Looked Upon As a Test Case—Both Sides Satisfied.

Montreal, Dec. 6.—In view of the verdict for \$300 damages given in the case of Anderson against the Protestant school commissioners of Montreal, it is now considered inevitable that sixteen other cases of the same kind will be settled on that basis.

EX-CLERGYMAN CONVICTED.

Found Guilty of Using Mails to Defraud.

Buffalo, N.Y., Dec. 6.—Charles Howe Manley, a former clergyman, was found guilty in the United States district court, of conspiracy to defraud and of using the mails to defraud. The extreme penalty is imprisonment for thirteen and a half years and \$2,500 fine. His wife fainted when the verdict was pronounced.

Manley advertised in thirty magazines for customers for portable buildings of all sorts. He had offices here under the name of the National Construction company, in which his female stenographers, with the help of rubber stamp signatures, figured as officers. One hundred and thirteen people in all parts of the country and in Toronto and other Canadian cities sent Manley orders, with sums ranging from \$100 to \$500. Most of those got nothing excepting a letter from the company. Mrs. J. Pierpont Morgan really received a portable playhouse, but Senator Joseph B. Foraker's wife, who sent \$101.25, got nothing. The evidence showed that Manley had no facilities for filling even an infinitesimal part of his promises. He received \$15,075 from his would-be customers, and gave back about \$3,500 under pressure.
