DIED AT A WINDOW

MRS. FELIX FARNEY ASPHYXIATED WITH GAS.

Her Husband Ran For a Doctor After Getting Her to a Window—Sudden Death of a Man Who Had Been Scalded.

A very sad death occurred on Sunday morning, when Mrs. Felix Farney lost her life by asphyxiation, and her husband had a marvelous escape from the same fate. At a quarter to six, Sunday morning, Mrs. Farney was awakened by the alarm clock, and she called her husband, telling him it was time to go to work. When the husband awakened he had a terrible headache, and it was nearly an hour before he could do anything. He managed to get his wife, who was also fearfully sick from the effects of the gas, to the window, and he then went to call the doctor. He could not make his way down the front stairs on account of the fumes, so climbed out the back window and down to the ground. He went to his wife's home on Brock street, and sent her youngest sister, Dr. Campbell, to return to his wife's aid.

Upon his return he found his wife in a stupor from which he could not arouse her. Her sister arrived a few moments after, but before she reached her side she had passed away. The deceased, whose maiden name was Nellie Vannasky, was the third daughter of Mrs. A. Vannasky, Brock street. Besides her sorrowing husband and mother, three sisters, Mrs. O'Riley, Miss Katie and Minnie, and two brothers, John, Cleveland, and Alexander, Philadelphia, are left to mourn.

The funeral will be held on Tuesday morning to St. Mary's cathedral.

The Late Wade Smith.

Wade Smith, the man so badly scalded at the cotton mill, early in November, died on Sunday at the General Hospital. Up to a few days ago every hope was held out for his recovery, but on Saturday night he began to fail, and on Sunday morning he passed away, death being due to a clot of blood on the heart.

The deceased came here from England with his family, only a few months ago, when he and some of his children secured employment in the cotton mill. He leaves a wife and five children to mourn. The sympathy of friends is extended to the sorrowing family in their bereavement. The funeral will be held Tuesday afternoon to Catawqui cemetery.

The Late Joseph Brennan.

Death came suddenly to Joseph Brennan, Johnson street, early Sunday morning. Mr. Brennan was taken ill on Friday morning, after returning with his sister from early mass in St. Mary's cathedral. He had been in apparently good health all week. His illness was diagnosed as typhoid fever. Late on Saturday night, he became worse, and was removed to the Hotel Dieu, where he died about three o'clock on Sunday morning.

The deceased was one of the best known barbers in the city. He was widely known as a most reliable and young man. He was of exemplary character, devoted in his religious duties, and a good example to his friends and associates. In his home he will be sadly missed, as he was devoted to his interests, and attached to father, sisters and brothers. His mother died over a year ago. He is survived by his father, two sisters, Miss Nellie and Minnie, at home; one sister, Miss Kate, at Hotel Dieu, Falls, and two brothers, John in Toronto, and James in Detroit. Mr. Brennan was a member of the Y.I.C. P.A., and a liberal in politics. The funeral will be held to-morrow morning.

THE INTERCOLLEGIATE HOCKEY SCHEDULE.

Kingston Yacht Club May Challenge—Hamilton II Won the Canadian Intermediate Rugby Championship.

The Canadian Intercollegiate Hockey Union executive met in Montreal, on Saturday and drew up the schedule for the winter's matches. Laval was admitted for this season, as an experiment. No financial requirement was made concerning the new club, until it is seen how things turn out this winter in that regard. Toronto University is the only club that would be affected by the addition of Laval, as it would mean two long trips to Montreal and the loss of much time on the part of the players. Queen's didn't ask for any financial allowance for admitting Laval. The report of the Montreal Star was wrong in that regard. The schedule is as follows: Senior—January 17th, Queen's at McGill, Laval at Toronto. January 24th, Toronto at Queen's; McGill at Laval, January 31st, Queen's at Laval; McGill at Toronto. February 7th, Laval at Queen's; Toronto at McGill. February 14th, McGill at Queen's; Toronto at Laval. February 21st, Queen's at Toronto; Laval at McGill. Intermediate—January 17th and 22nd, matches between Queen's II and Royal Military College I. Junior—On January 27th and 29th, Kingston Collegiate Institute and Royal Military College II. will play. On February 3rd and 5th, Queen's III will play the winner.

Kingston May Challenge.

Watertown, N.Y., Standard. According to the statement of a well-known member of the Crescent Yacht Club, recently the local club firmly expects that Kingston will formally challenge for the George cup for eighteen raters next summer, and it is expected that at least four challengers will appear to fight supremacy against the Crescent. The same member of the club also said that the Kathleen will probably be the boat which will represent Kingston, and said that with a little more tuning up it will be the current opinion that she will be a dangerous antagonist, particularly in calm weather and smooth seas. Oswego is almost certain to have a boat, and it is stated that Clayton has turned covetous eyes toward the big challenge cup, and is contemplating the construction of a craft. Toronto is a possibility, too, and it is more than probable that some genuine races will be seen of Champort among the eighteen-footers before the end of next season.
