Synopsis of Canadian Northwest

Any even numbered section of Domin-ion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not re-served, may be homesteaded by any per-son the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more

Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency. Entry by proxy may, however, be mad at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader. An application for entry or cancellation made personally at any sub-agent's office may be wired to the Agent by the Sub-agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such applicaon receipt of the telegram such applica-tion is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

In case of "personation" or fraud the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim or if entry has been granted it will be summarily cancelled. An application for cancellation must be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for cancellation will be received from an individual until that application has been disposed of.
Where an entry is cancelled subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for Cancellation will be entitled to prior right of entry.

Applicant for cancellation must state in what particulars the homesteader is in

subject of cancellation proceedings may subject to the approval of Depart-ment, relinquish it in favor of father, ment, reinquish it in layor of father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister if eligible, but to no one else, on filing declaration of abandonment.

DUTIES—A settler is required to perform the duties under one of the followg plans :-- (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will

not meet this requirement.

(3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a home-stead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the fath-(4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as mean-ing not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road al-


