Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Homestead Regulations.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person over 18 years of age, or male over 15 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less. Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency. Entry by proxy may, however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going on in the Business World—The Markets.

Canada's exports to Japan for the nine months ending March were \$111,377.

The world's coal production for 1906 was about 1,106,478,700 short tons. Of this amount the United States produced 114,157,300 tons, or 37.5 per cent.

According to the figures prepared by W. King, the apple shipments from the ports of Montreal and Quebec have been 31 to November 30th, totalled 629,366 barrels, compared with 107,798 barrels in 1906, an increase of over fifty per cent.

The fire loss of the United States in Canada for November, as compiled by the New York Journal of Commerce and Commercial Bulletin, shows a total of \$19,123,300, or nearly three million dollars more than the sum chargeable against the same month of the preceding year.
