Of "Twelfth Night" at The Grand Opera House, Last Evening—The Characters Were All Well Taken.

A fairly good house greeted the presentation of Shakespeare's delightful tale of romance, "Twelfth Night," by Queen's University Dramatic Club at the Grand Opera House, last evening. When one reflects that the club is a purely amateur dramatic organization it is hard to over-step the bounds of propriety in commendation of the tout ensemble. The cast was well balanced indeed, and each of the various characters interpreted his or her role with a carefulness and precision which would by no means have brought discredit upon a much more pretentious group of actors.

As "Isabella," Miss Ada Chown displayed dramatic talent which is indeed seldom encountered on the stage. Her interpretation of the character was admirable and, supplemented by her pleasing naturalness of bearing, merited to the full the hearty applause frequently accorded her. Miss Chown ever elect to go up the stage, her profound dramatic appreciation, coupled with her art of unaffected yet adequate presentation, will win for her a future of renown.

"Olivia," the rich countess, was cleverly portrayed by Miss Girdler. There was ever present in her manner the melancholy predilection of her by "Maria," until her betrothal to "Sebastian," was consummated, Miss Jean Campbell, in the role of "Maria," played her part exceedingly well; the devising and execution of her plot to deceive "Malvolio," was cleverly drawn and consistent throughout.

**FACES NEGRO PROBLEM.**

Question is Not Confined to the United States.

Philadelphia, Dec. 13.—"The gravity of the negro problem is not confined to the United States. England faces it in all her colonies. Almost the whole world faces it. The problem of the future of that race is one of the greatest and gravest confronting civilization."

Sir John Roger, governor of the English gold coast colony, Southwest Africa, expressed these views last night in an address at the Berean Presbyterian church in Philadelphia.

"In Africa," he said, "negroes outnumber the whites in the proportion of 5,000,000 to 1,000. How to educate them is as grave a question there as in America. Our greatest trouble is to induce them to work with their hands in the trades. The hope of the negro race lies in manual labor."

"I have little doubt that the colored race in America will soon realize this and will really take their place among the other races here."

**O. M. PALMER KILLED.**

Glen Park Foreman Caught By Revolving Shaft.

Watertown, N.Y., Dec. 13.—Orville M. Palmer, foreman of the pulp department at the Ontario paper mill at Glen Park, was killed by a horrible death last night by being caught and whirled a dozen times or more about a shaft revolving at the rate of 145 times a minute.

Every article of clothing, with the exception of a waist band to an undershirt and a stocking, was torn from Palmer's body before it dropped behind one of the benches. When picked up by a fellow-workman portions of broken bones protruded through the flesh. The man's agony was awful. He was taken to the office, where, stretched out on a pile of blankets, he remained conscious until 7:30 o'clock to-night. Death ensued fifteen minutes later, with his wife at his head.

Mr. Palmer had been in the employ of the International Paper Company since the Ontario mill was built, some twenty years ago, and was one of those who helped construct the mill. For some years he had acted as foreman of the day gang.

Walkerville, Ont., Dec. 13.—Late last night people in Wolf's road house, three miles above, heard cries for help from the river. Two men were found helpless in a boat which was drifting down over half a mile, several attempts to reach it being made. The boat finally went near enough to shore to enable the rescuers to get a rope to the men who were pulled ashore nearly exhausted. The men proved to be two Windsor men, who were working for the ferry company on Peche Island. They started to cross to the main land, but got stuck in the ice.

**Admitted His Guilt.**

Ottawa, Dec. 13.—Ewart S. Tressider, an Ottawa young man, this morning, pleaded guilty, in the magistrate's court, to bigamy by having on December 2nd, 1907, married Miss M. Sinclair, a girl in nineteen years old and a recent arrival from Scotland, having already another wife living. The other Mrs. Tressider was married here in April of this year. Several other charges against Tressider were dropped for lack of evidence. He will be sentenced next Monday.

**Killed By Falling Boom.**

Ottawa, Dec. 13.—William John Lucy, aged forty-two years, formerly of Smith's Falls, died here, this morning, as a result of a fractured skull, sustained by the fall of a derrick boom, yesterday afternoon. He was employed in the construction of a pier, for the white bridge across the Rideau river, about one mile from the city.
