The Very Latest Collected From All Over The World.

Mrs. N. Longworth passed a very comfortable night, and is doing splendidly.

The democratic national convention will be held in Denver on July 7th, 1908.

Hon. W. J. Hanna, provincial secretary, is confined to his room with an attack of grippe.

Orders are issued for the winding up of the Northern Ontario Steamship company, of New Liskenard.

The sixteen armor-clads of the American navy are ready to start, next Monday, on their projected cruise to the western coast.

Officials at C. P. headquarters continue silence regarding the reported negotiations of a controlling interest in the Boston and Maine railway.

Fire destroyed \$30,000 worth of furs in the store of A. K. Jeffrey, furrier, Yonge street, Toronto. Neighboring firms suffered to the extent of \$5,000 by smoke.

Empress Alexandra's condition is somewhat improved to-day. The fever has abated. The court physicians are treating the empress for anaemia and neuralgia.

From what he considered a trifling injury received at the recent polo show, New York, Nicholas Dunn, the noted horseman, died, Wednesday, in Tarrytown, N.Y.

An investigation into the fire and nitro-glycerine explosion at the Peabody torpedoes works, which occurred on October 17th, has been ordered by the attorney-general's department.

Senator Platt says he will make way for President Roosevelt should the president desire to become a member of the United States senate after his term in the White House expires.

The terms under which the Dominion Iron and Steel company will mine coal from the areas, under option from the Cumberland Railway and Coal company, is the payment of ten cents per ton.

George P. Nichols, former postmaster of Rye, who absconded with a shortage of \$1,200, and who was arrested in Indianapolis, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to eighteen months in prison.

E. B. Teit, a Boston capitalist, interested in telephones about the country, will acquire the Watertown, N.Y., plant of the Citizens' Telephone company, as well as a floating indebtedness of about \$2,000.

In an action at Lovell, N.Y., to recover penalties for the sale of adulterated milk, from the Lieberman Dairy company at Port Leyden, \$2,000 was judgment in fine.

At New York William Seebel was burned to death and Robert Dwyer and his wife, Catherine, was so badly burned they are in a serious condition as the result of a fire that destroyed a building on East 9th street.

The Standard Oil steamer Baku, from Rouen for Philadelphia, has arrived at Queenstown, Ireland, badly damaged in the recent heavy gales along the Atlantic coast. Nearly everyone of the officers and crew suffered more or less serious injuries.

The railway commission having completed its enquiry into express train charges as far as they relate to general rates, in this afternoon, considering behind closed doors, whether the necessity of going into special rates will be submitted to the supreme court for decision.

WOMAN'S GOOD WORK

ART ASSOCIATION CLOSES SUCCESSFUL YEAR.

Yearly This Exhibition Improves—Water Colors, Portraits, Ceramics, Burnt Work, and Lace Shown—Picture Sales Good.

The Kingston Woman's Art Association has been holding an exhibition of paintings, and handicrafts in the society's new rooms, over the Ontario Powder company office. All the exhibits are well worth seeing.

Perhaps the most striking picture of all is a view of Kingston, by Mrs. Joseph Power, the soft blending of tones in lake and land, and sky being very artistic. A bit along the Collins Bay road, looking towards a blazing sunset, is also a worthy thing from this artist's brush. Space forbids further mention of her work, Miss J. Drummond shows among a number of charming sketches, the Donnelly, lying in the slip at the wharf. It may be mentioned that this sketch met with the unqualified approval of several unprejudiced small boys and workmen who saw the sketch being made. Miss Ella Fraser shows another of her fine interiors, the old stairway at the fort. Mrs. John Strange won particular praise for a sketch of the old cottage in a yard off Barrack street. Miss Maud Betts' corner of "Hazelde" is attractive, and so is Miss M. King's view of some Brockville spires. Miss Kathleen Crisp and Miss Gertrude Power, have also several pretty pictures. Miss Helen Fraser has two fine portraits on exhibition, those of our worthy mayor, and of her brother, George Fraser.

In other branches of art Mrs. R. Hooper has some china painting, some of it following out the latest ideas in ceramics. One, the fish pattern, and another, highly conventionalized holly, are very attractive. Mrs. A. King shows a beautiful collar of modern print, and there are a number of pretty trifles from the fingers of various members of the association. Sales of pictures have been particularly good.

A RELIGIOUS CENSUS

Of Kingston to Be Taken Early Next Year. A meeting of the pastors and Sunday school superintendents of the city, held under the auspices of the Evangelical Alliance, was held in the council chamber of the city hall, on Thursday afternoon, most of the past of the meeting was to consider the advisability of taking a census of the religious forces of the city. A general conference brought out that the feeling was common that such a census should be expedient, and on motion of Dean Farthing, it was resolved that a religious census of the city be taken toward the end of January or early in February, and that the secretary, Rev. J. Charles Villiers, be instructed to write to Thomas Yellowlows, of the Ontario Sunday School Association, to ask his aid and co-operation in taking the census at that time or at a time as near thereto as is agreeable to him. A committee was appointed to make preliminary engagements.

TO BEGIN OPERATIONS

Towards the Erection of the Lead Smelter. W. M. Weigel, of St. Louis, Mo., has moved into the city to take charge of the erection and operation of the lead smelter to be erected in Kingston, under the supervision of Robert E. Cushman, general manager. Mr. Weigel has been superintendent of the St. Louis Smelting and Refining company of St. Louis, for a number of years, and has also been in the employ of the Guggenheim Exploration company, and is fully qualified by his operating lead smelters in the United States to properly handle the erection and operation of this plant. Mr. Weigel will devote the balance of this month to drafting plans for the plant and work will begin actively on or about Jan. 1st. Mr. Weigel says that the plant will be completed and in operation by June 1st, 1908. The company has opened their office at the smelter site, where all business will be transacted for the present.

WANTS IT DECLARED

Marshall was formerly a furniture dealer here and went to Garden Island one day, seven years ago, with a cargo of lumber and never returned.
