HIS HARD TREATMENT

WHAT A YOUNG ENGLISHMAN SAID WAS DONE.

Was Chained and Imprisoned Because He Would Not Work For a Firm on the Terms They Proposed.

Montreal, Dec. 12.—John Kery, a young Englishman, who has been in Canada only about twelve months, has, through the law firm of Greenshield, Greenfield & Langue, instituted an action in superior court for \$10,000 against McEneaney, Chandler & McNeill, railway contractors, alleging unlawful arrest and cruelty. Kery alleges that he was employed to work for the firm in Northern Ontario at \$35 a month and board, but on getting to work, was informed that he would get \$1.75 a day and must provide for himself. He was glad to be discharged and went to a neighboring camp. Eight days afterwards he was seized by agents of his former employers and chained in a boarding house, at Englehart, for three days and nearly driven mad by the brutal treatment. He was then removed to a log shanty where he was further imprisoned for eight days, half starved and nearly driven mad by flies. He was then taken to North Bay, and, without being given any opportunity for defence, was sentenced to jail for a month on a charge of desertion, but was only detained twelve days when he was told to get out and back to Montreal as best he could.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Resignation of a Collegiate Teacher Accepted.

At the Board of Education meeting last evening, the resignation of L. E. Staples, A. A., a collegiate science teacher, was accepted. It is understood that Mr. Staples has been appointed to a position in Ingersoll at an increased salary.

These management committee recommendations were adopted: That Miss Cannon of Sydenham school and Miss Eva Gilbert of Central school, exchange places; that a female adults' class be opened in connection with the domestic science department, tuition to be given once a week, and no fee charged.

There was a discussion on what amount should be paid Miss Shaw and Mr. Hatch for art and manual training to the pedagogy students. The matter was referred back to management.

The enrolled attendance at the Collegiate for November in the public schools was 2,193 and the Collegiate Institute, 418, both being increases over the same month last year.

The property committee has prepared plans for five escapes for the schools, \$250 each.

Next year's committee will deal with the matter.

It was decided that the schools should re-open after the holidays on Monday, January 6th.

Chairman Letourneau was given the thanks of the board for the efficient, impartial and gentlemanly manner in which he had presided during the year. In thanking the board, Mr. Letourneau referred to the work of the year, and urged next year's board to re-establish the fifth class in the public schools.

HIGH COURT CONCLUDED.

Two Cases Were Settled Between the Parties.

The sittings of the high court were concluded this morning. The first case called was an action brought by Louise Lefebvre against R. Vashon Rogers, administrator of the estate of the late Julia J. Martin, to enforce an agreement. W. F. Nickle appeared for the defendant and J. L. Whiting for the plaintiff. The case was settled between the parties, \$1,500 being awarded to the plaintiff.

The whole outfit was found at the foot of the mountain, but the reservoir, this morning, was a wreck, but the horse was only slightly injured.
