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SYNOPSIS OF Canadian North-west HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved for the benefit of any person over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency, Entry by proxy may, however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

An application for entry or cancellation made personally at any sub-agent's office may be wired to the Agent by the applicant, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant or held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.

In case of "persecution" or fraud the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim or if entry has been granted it will be summarily cancelled.

An application for cancellation must be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for cancellation will be received from an individual until that application has been cancelled.

Where an entry is cancelled subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for cancellation will be entitled to prior right of entry.

Applicant for cancellation must state in what particular the homesteader is in fault.

A homesteader whose entry is not the subject of cancellation proceedings may be subject to the right of Department, relinquish it in favor of father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister if eligible, but not less than eighty (80) acres in extent.

DECLARATION OF ABANDONMENT.—A settler is required to perform the duties under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent.

(3) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned jointly with another person in land which does not meet this requirement.

(4) If the father, mother, or if the father is deceased, of a homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, the homesteader may, if he so desires, perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself, must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.

Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to do so.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for a period of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not more than 2,500 acres shall be leased to one individual or company.

ROYALTY.—A royalty of 10 per cent on the rate of five cents per ton shall be collected on the merchantable coal mined.

CLAIMS.—A person sixteen years of age or over, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1,500x1,500 feet.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof.

LOCATOR.—The locator must be a Canadian citizen, and upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per acre.

ROYALTY.—A royalty of 10 per cent on the rate of five cents per ton shall be collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.

The Opera House orchestra was a very agreeable accompaniment and several times met the special favor of the company. The rattle of cutlery was still for the presentation of a gold-mounted silk umbrella to Chairman Jack on behalf of the Sir. It simply, as a token of appreciation of his protecting care. Over a year ago advancing age compelled him to relinquish his editorial work. He spent the summer at his cottage on Binsular Lake and remained in Huntsville at the end of the season. Though Mr. Simpson had been in poor health for several months his condition did not assume a critical aspect until a week ago. He is survived by his wife and two sons, W. K. Simpson, Toronto, and George Simpson, Ottawa.
