GOOD THINGS PROMISED FOR THIS YEAR.

Teams Entered in Junior Series, Four in Senior—Enquiries About Formation Local District League.

A meeting of the City Hockey League was held in the Frontenac Business College on Monday evening. The league has every promise this year of being better than ever before. Ten teams were entered in the junior series and four teams in the senior. A schedule was not drawn up on account of the ice being in such poor condition and it was not known when the first game could be called off.

During the past few days Mr. Stockdale has received communications from different outside towns asking for games, and also asking about the formation of a local district league to include Brockville, Gananoque, Kingston, Napanee, Deseronto and Belleville. The matter was fully discussed at the meeting last evening, and it was decided to try and arrange the matter. Delegates from the different towns will meet at the Randolph Hotel on New Year's day, when the teams will be entered and the matter fully arranged. T. N. Stockdale and J. J. McEldermott were appointed local delegates with full powers to act in the matter. The league will likely be divided into districts. Gananoque wants to put in two teams and Brockville one team, this will make one district. Four teams in Kingston will make another district and the three western towns, Napanee, Deseronto and Belleville will club together for the third district. The teams will play home and home games, and the winners of each section play off.

The formation of this league, if properly handled, will be one of the best things that could happen for junior hockey in this district. It will just be another school of training for the boys before they are ready to enter O. H. A. ranks. The local men at the back of the enterprise should receive every support possible from the citizens, who should try and make it a success. Some fine junior games should be pulled off here this winter if the thing goes through.

Frontenac Senior Hockey Team. It being understood that the 14th Hockey Club has abandoned its idea of having a hockey team this winter, a movement is on foot to re-organize the senior Frontenac. The sporting fraternity of the old Limestone City will be pleased to welcome back to the senior company a team representing the famous old Frontenacs. It is likely a meeting for the purpose of organization will take place on Thursday evening.

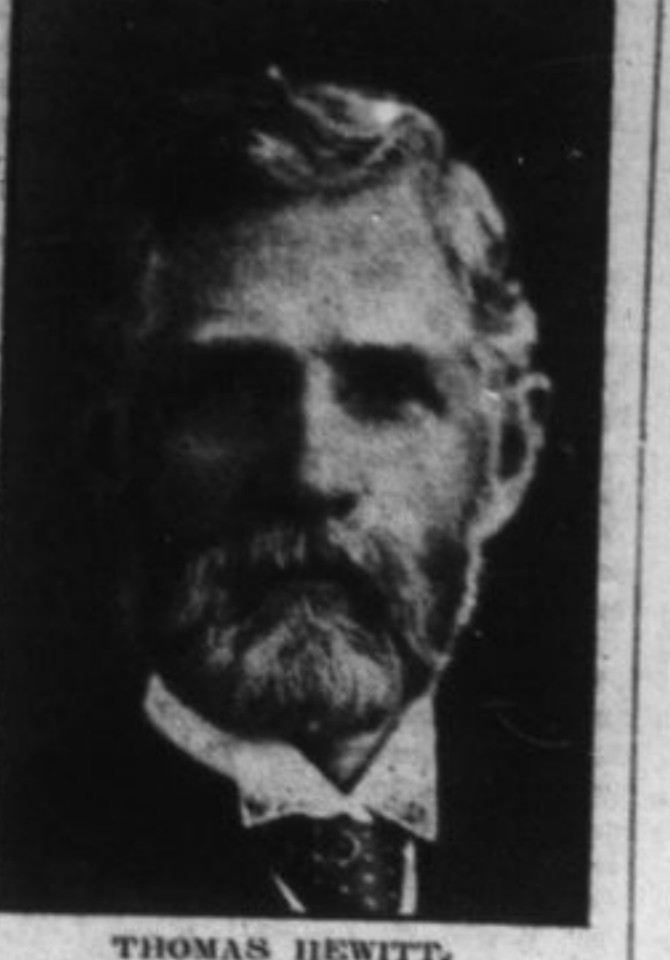

TWENTY YEARS SERVICE.

As Superintendent of the Local Waterworks.

It is just twenty years ago since the city took over the water works and appointed Thomas Hewitt as superintendent. On January 1st, 1888, Mr. Hewitt became an employee of the city. He has continued as such ever since, so that to-morrow he celebrates an auspicious anniversary.

Mr. Hewitt was born near Manchester, in England, in 1850. He served

his apprenticeship as a plumber, and became proficient when quite a young man. In July, 1870, he came to Canada, and settled in Kingston. Shortly after his arrival he became connected with the locomotive works as a plumber, and remained as such until the company owning the plant, till the city came into possession when he became superintendent.

Every mayor and alderman who has sat in the city council for the past twenty years can testify to the splendid work done by Mr. Hewitt in the interests of the water works. He has been diligent and faithful. So hard has he worked for the city that he has been in poor health for some time past and the city council has granted him three months' leave of absence to recuperate. He expects to leave during the second week of January for England to visit the scenes of his childhood.

During the past twenty years, the number of water works consumers has quadrupled, and the people are paying hardly a third as much as was paid twenty years ago for water supply.

YOUNG LADY INSULTED.

Held Up By Rowdies on King Street West.

Another young lady was held up on King street west, just 11.30, about nine o'clock, when on her way home she was passing the corner of King and Centre streets, when stopped by two men, who used very insulting language, one tried to make her way on into town, and they kept following her, trying to keep her back.
