## HE WAS THE ASSASSIN

**Shot Brother Officer in Prussia on Christmas Day.**

**Escaped and Left No Trace--If Found Guilty Will Be Shot in His Own Garrison.**

Alsenstein, East Prussia, Jan. 2--heard some one descending the stairs. Drawing his revolver, he went to meet the intruder, and tried to shoot him. The revolver, however, missed fire, and Von Goeben then killed the major and made his escape, without leaving any trace behind him. He was subsequently arrested upon suspicion, and confessed at the preliminary examination.

Von Goeben will be tried by court-martial, and if found guilty will be executed by shooting in his own garrison.

### COMPANY MAKES DEFAULT.

Unpleasant Announcement For Steamship Shareholders.

New York, Jan. 2--Announcement has been made on behalf of the Consolidated Steamship Lines by N. H. Campbell, the treasurer, that the company would default on interest on its \$60,000,000 collateral trust bonds, due on Wednesday.

The official statement explains the reason for the default: "The inability of the company to make the payment of interest on its bonds on the above date is chiefly due to the fact that while it has made most substantial earnings, after paying interest on the underlying bonds and with other interest and general charges, owing to the prevailing financial conditions, it has been compelled to devote its earnings to the payment for new ships recently completed or under construction, and is unable to meet the coupons maturing on the above date."

The Consolidated Steamship company is popularly known as the Morse Coastwise Steamship company.

### MAN WHO TOOK CANTON.

Captain Unveiled to Memory of Capt. Wm. Bate.

Ottawa, Jan. 2--On December 29th, 1857, Captain William Thornton Bate, commander of Her Majesty's ship *Acteon*, while landing his men at the storming of Canton, China, was shot from a wall and killed. On Sunday, fifty years later, to the day, his cousin, Gerald Bate, erected in All Saints' church, Ottawa, a magnificent memorial to his memory. It is suitably inscribed and was unveiled by Rev. A. W. Mackay.

There is also a monument in Hong Kong in memory of the dead commanding officer.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over the World.

Japan has issued a memorandum in reply to the suggestions on the restriction of immigration offered by the United States government.

Toronto had an exciting election contest, in which Joseph Oliver was elected mayor for 1908 by nearly 7,000 majority over George Dr. Beattie Nesbitt getting third place.

The captain of the C.P.R. steamer John B. G. John, N.B., on Wednesday, reports seeing a vessel off Salte Island, which is believed to be the "missing Mount Royal."

A Grand Trunk train was derailed near Barrie. The cars rolled over two or three times and landed right side up at the foot of the embankment. The passengers escaped with a few bruises.

W. B. Parry has been appointed to look after the interests of the Canadian Northern railway, in the maritime provinces, taking over a portion of the duties recently discharged by C. W. Spencer, who was general manager of the system east of Fort William.

London, Jan. 2--The trial of 160 members of the first column, who signed the Viborg manifesto, was concluded, Tuesday. One hundred and sixty-seven of them were convicted and sentenced to three months' imprisonment, while two were acquitted on the ground that they had signed under misapprehension. The sentence carries with it the loss of all political rights.
