MORE EARTHQUAKES

HEAVY SHOCK IN JAMAICA YESTERDAY.

Damage in Kingston—Said to Be Great—Buildings Shattered, Church Reduced to Debris—Feared Whole Island Has Suffered.

James Town, Jan. 4.—A heavy earthquake shock was felt throughout the island of Jamaica at 3.50 o'clock, yesterday morning, and it is feared that much damage was done. St. Andrew's was the chief sufferer in the north. The Episcopal church, which has been badly shaken by the big quake of last year was reduced to debris, and other buildings in the town were damaged. There are reports that much harm was done in Kingston and other points on the south shore.

London, Jan. 4.—The Emigrants' Information Office has issued a circular containing a new feature, namely hints to emigrants. These are told that it is useless to go to Canada unless they adapt themselves to local conditions and respect local feelings. "Be content to learn first, rather than teach," it says. "Don't above all things, get beefsteak and beer to his liking; think the land of his adoption a very poor sort of place, and does not hesitate to say so."

TORONTO WILL HONOR

Edward Hanlan With a Public Funeral.

Toronto, Jan. 4.—The Toronto city council will give the late Edward Hanlan a public funeral on Tuesday afternoon. A wreath was sent by the city council to-day. The question of whether or not the body will lie in state in city council chamber, Tuesday morning, has not been decided as yet, but such has been suggested by friends of Hanlan. The mayor to-day paid tribute to the memory of the great oarsman who had done more than any other man in his time to advertise Toronto and Canada.

Two affidavits figured in the parks' enquiry this morning. One of these, which was a retraction of certain statements about alleged immoral conduct on the part of John Chambers, parks commissioner, was said by William Jordan, to be false. Jordan's name was signed to the statement and he swore that the signature was a forgery. Jordan also told of a man named Boyd coming from Ontario, New York state, and attempting to persuade him to sign a similar document, but he stated absolutely that he never signed it. The document was not read in court.

VALUE OF EXPORTS

From Canada to United States Very Large.

Windsor, Ont., Jan. 4.—The total value of exports from Canada to the United States through Windsor for the year was \$3,571,774, an increase of more than a million and a quarter over the previous year. The export of whiskey to the United States last year reached a total of \$1,034,337. This is one of the biggest items in the list. The value of whiskey exported in the previous year was \$845,183. A larger number of persons moved from Windsor district to the United States in 1907 than in 1906. The total value of household effects which passed over the border in 1907 was \$1,066,896, as compared with \$72,011 in 1906.

Wife Island, Jan. 3.—A very pretty wedding took place at the home of Mrs. James Kyle, on Tuesday evening, when her only daughter, Miss Maud, was united in matrimony to Robert Horn, of the foot of the island. The bride looked charming, wearing a costume of white silk, and was ably assisted by Miss Maggie Keeley, who also wore a very pretty costume. James Kehon was best man. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Mr. Lancaster. The young couple received many costly and numerous presents, showing the high esteem in which the bride was held. They left for an extended trip on the American side. On going away the bride wore a pretty travelling suit of blue, red, and black. Her relatives on the island, Miss Tressa Spoor is home with her parents, from Toronto. J. D. Cosgrove will teach in the village separate school this year. Miss Sadie McArde will teach in the front school.

Taken By Storm.

Yarker, Jan. 3.—One of the latest residences in Yarker is owned by Uncle Thomas Burgess, and his home was taken last night, by storm; the Moscovites coming down in great numbers and taking full possession of it. No resistance could be offered, as they came well laden with the many good things of life, and the generous old couple gave them the freedom of their home. All fully enjoyed themselves, and such sociability is not generally seen, but the Moscovites, in the old couple who were once residents of that place. After singing Ald Lang Syne and the national anthem, they left for their homes.

The Yarmouth Divorce Case.

London, Jan. 4.—Announcement of the filing of the writ of Yarmouth's suit for annulment of her marriage to the Earl of Yarmouth, is perturbing England less on account of the scandal than as a result of the discovery that the marriage settlement was such as to render it impossible for the earl to retain any of the Thaw wealth. Physicians, it is said, will be the only witnesses.

Vancouver Riot Case.

Vancouver, Jan. 4.—A fourth Japanese was arrested to-day on the charge of attempted murder in the "Little Riot" on New Year's morning. Fredman Prost had his nose cut off in the fight, but will recover. All the victims are now doing well. Little evidence against the arrested Japanese has been secured, except that when arrested they had on blood-spattered clothing.

Campbell-Bannerman's Nephew.

A. Campbell, of Glasgow, Scotland, a nephew of Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, was in the city on Friday. He is on a pleasure trip to Canada. Mr. Campbell is connected with a large Scottish dry-goods house. He left to-day for Montreal.

Two young men from Enterprise arrived in the city this morning, and were removed to the general hospital in R. J. Reid's ambulance. Both were suffering from fever.

CAT AND DOG KILLED

TWO FAMILIES SLAIN BY RUSSIAN BANDITS.

Out of Thirteen Persons, Only Three Little Children Escape With Their Lives. Moscow, Jan. 4.—Two families were practically exterminated this week at a lonely farm on the Stepanovsk, near Novotcherkan by a band of robbers, who dispatched even the household cat and dog.

The names of the killed are Bondarenko, his wife, his son, Nikita, his fourteen-year-old daughter, Xenia, and a young man named Stepanov, near the other family, Gretchenko, his wife, his brother, and his two young children. Three little boys of the Bondarenko family hid from the murderers and escaped.

It appears that the Bondarenko family had just retired for the night, when the floor was burst in and three strangers entered. Brandishing revolvers, they commanded every one to come out. Dazed with sleep, the family obeyed, and saw several other men and ropes outside the door. Bondarenko was ordered to hand over all the money he had. He replied that he possessed only \$4, to which the robber leader retorted that that would give his men just five cents each.

At this point, the girl, Xenia, fell into hysterics. A robber threw a cloth over her, and fastened her with a hatchet. The boy, Nikita, and the young man, Limorenko, were next seized and killed in the same manner. Bondarenko and his wife were then locked up in a cupboard, whence they heard the robbers enter the adjoining building, where the Gretchenkos slept. Shrieks and groans arose as the whole Gretchenko family were overpowered and murdered. Gretchenko's wife was strangled with a piece of rope.

Next the robbers returned drawn sword forth Bondarenko and his wife, and slaughtered them. The three youngest children, escaped the murderers' notice and were left alone with the dead. A peasant visiting the farm, discovered the tragedy and rescued the children next day.

The bodies were found in different places, showing that the victims had made vain attempts at flight. Some of them had their hands tied behind their backs. On the girl, Xenia's battered face traces of tears were still visible.
