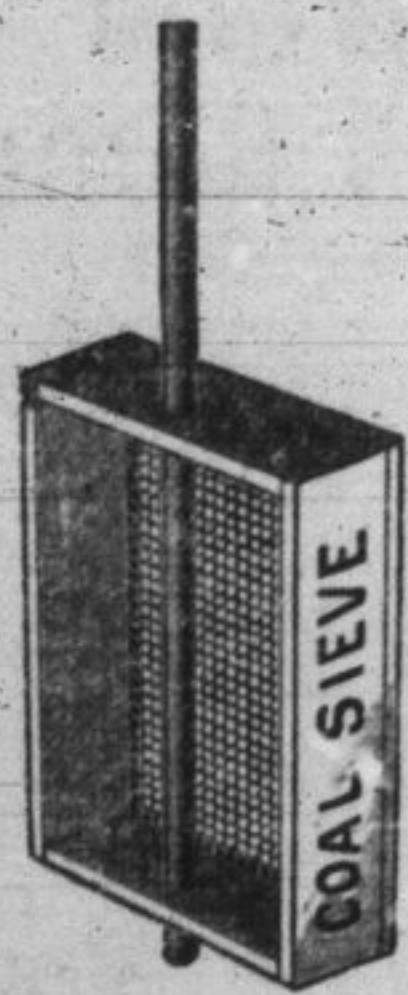

Loins, 15 per cent.; ribs, 10 per cent.; rounds, 21 per cent.; chuck, 10 per cent.; plates, 16 per cent.; flanks, 4 per cent.; shanks, 7 per cent.; tail, 3 per cent.; kidneys, 0.25 per cent.; sausage meat, 1 per cent.; shank meat, 1.50 per cent.; tankage, 2 per cent.; loss in cutting, 2.25 per cent.

VERY BADLY INJURED

JOHN LEE FELL DOWN STAIRS BACKWARDS. Ear Nearly Cut Off and His Wrist Broken—A Young Lady Injured—Her Ankle—Gananoque Schools Closed For Funerarium.

Gananoque, Jan. 4.—John Lee, Brock street, met with a very severe accident at his home, yesterday morning. In going up stairs with a lighted lamp in his hand, he fell backward, striking his head on a stove near the foot of the stairs, one ear being almost entirely cut off, and one of his wrists broken, and his leg also hurt. The unfortunate man is in a most critical condition.

Thursday afternoon, as Miss Edith McCammon, sister of Mayor J. A. McCammon, and only daughter of Town Clerk and Mrs. Samuel McCammon, was crossing King street, on the crossing between the Merchants' bank and Sine's drug store, she slipped and fell, injuring her ankle to such an extent that she had to be taken into the drugstore, where she fainted away.
