ROSS ELECTED MAYOR

He Defeated Ald. Toye by 471 Majority.

Harty, Robertson and McCartney Elected Aldermen--Anglin, Craig and Chown are the Three New School Trustees.

By a vote of 1,793 to 1,322, the electors of Kingston, on Monday, decided in favor of Ald. Ross as mayor, and elected Ald. A. E. Ross, M.D., as mayor. Early in the day it was seen that Ald. Toye was second in the race. Like many another worthy candidate, he went down to defeat. No one can say that Ald. Toye did not deserve to be elected. He gave the citizens ten years faithful service in the city council, and yesterday was handed out a very poor reward. The organization of his opponent was admirable. The whole conservative machine was at work, and assisted by many independent liberal voters, it succeeded in practically ending the municipal career of a man who did not have a "machine" behind him, and who should have been made mayor by acclamation, on his good record. However, the people voted otherwise, and Dr. Ross is mayor of Kingston for 1908:

of his supporters, journeyed to the News office, where the returns were heard. When the results were given from the different polling places, giving Ald. Ross a majority, there was great rejoicing. About seven o'clock, when nearly all the returns in the majority contest had been given, Ald. Ross and his supporters went over to Ontario hall, where speeches were made. Three or four big husky fellows carried the doctor over to the hall on their shoulders, and there was much cheering on the way.

Upon arrival at the hall, the mayor-elect shook hands with a large number, and was then called upon for a speech. "I am indeed very grateful to my many friends in Kingston, who have worked so hard to-day, and who have placed me in the office I find myself elected to to-night," said the mayor-elect. "I am sure that you must feel that it is an honor for anyone to be elected as mayor of the city of Kingston, and to one who was supposed to be unknown to Kingstonians, it is indeed a great honor. I wish to thank the men and the boys who have worked for me and placed me in this position of honor. I hope that I will bring no discredit upon the men who have worked for me, and the citizens who have elected me as mayor."

"I am very grateful to the electors in my own ward, who have given me a majority of over 200," continued the speaker. "I know that I have worked and done my best for the people of Frontenac ward, and I am glad that they appreciate my services in the past. Nor do I forget the hard and faithful work done by my friends in Sydenham ward, in keeping the majority down to less than fifty. In his concluding remarks, the speaker said that everyone present knew well enough what it was to ensure the work in such a campaign, for even one month. He was very tired, but would say that, although tired, he was very grateful. He had one wish to make, and that was that the result in this campaign would make no difference in the weight of bread. He could say nothing more than to again thank all who had supported him. "I thank you from the bottom of my heart," were his concluding remarks.

Ald. Nickle was then called upon and responded. He said that he had been wondering who was the lame horse in the campaign. He believed that there had been no politics whatsoever, in this election. He looked upon it as a tribute to a man who had fearlessly stated his ideas and stood for what he thought was right. It was commendation of the principle that civic plants belonged to the few. They belonged to the people, and the people should have the benefit of them. He felt confident that Dr. Ross, whom he had known for twenty-two years, would make an excellent mayor.

"In electing him, the electors do themselves and the city of Kingston credit," said Ald. Nickle. Ald. Angrove was then asked to speak, and his remarks were brief. He extended thanks to the supporters of Dr. Ross, and stated that Ald. Toye had made the statement that if Ald. Ross, Nickle or the speaker would come out for mayor, it would be pie for him (Ald. Toye) in such a contest. The speaker wondered if Ald. Toye got his pie all right. Ald. Angrove was the last speaker, and the meeting then adjourned.

The Aldermen Elected. The aldermen elected were Dr. "Jack" Harty in Cataraqui ward, Ald. H. N. Robertson in Frontenac ward, and William McCartney in Rideau ward. Dr. Harty entered municipal politics by jumping into Cataraqui ward, and defeating his opponent by 142 majority. The people of Frontenac ward gave their final answer to Joseph

A PICTURESQUE FIGURE

At the Social Functions at Washington, D.C.

Mehmed Ali Bey, the new representative of the empire of Turkey at Washington, is a picturesque figure at the social functions, involving the diplomatic corps at the national capital. He is a broad-minded Turk of the more liberal regime in Turkey and speaks French fluently, and English to some extent. Mehmed Ali Bey has had a long and careful training in the diplomatic service of the sultan, and has spent much of his time in Paris, where he came in touch with western ideas and manners, so that his knowledge of American affairs is superior to that of most oriental rulers. He is said to be very close to his imperial master, due to the story goes, to his having saved the sultan's life in some mysterious fashion.

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CLAIMS TWO LIVES

A Woman Who is Like Jekyll and Hyde.

Magazine Says She Can Remember Cliffs, Stone Axes, Shaggy Men and Bears.

St. Louis, Jan. 7.--Charged with stealing jewels from a west end house, Mrs. Susan Edwards McGee, nurse, maid, authoress, and scholar, lying in the city hospital, suffering from hysteria, declares she has a dual personality. Mrs. McGee says she is a second, Jekyll and Hyde--The physicians were for a time under the impression that she was insane, but they have changed their opinions, and now believe that the case is one of the most remarkable they have ever dealt with. Mrs. McGee is twenty-seven years old, but appears to be no more than twenty. She was married when but sixteen, and divorced three years ago, since which time she has been traveling about the country, working as a maid and at other times as a nurse. She has written for several magazines under the nom de plume of Alexander Watson, but says that the income derived from her writings did not warrant her devoting her entire time to it, so she took up housework.

Horrible Accident.
Smith's Falls, Ont., Jan. 7.--J. Chorghann, proprietor of the Smith's Falls woollen mill, met with a horrible accident on Saturday. While engaged in adjusting a belt in his factory, his left arm was caught and drawn round a pulley. He could not extricate it and the arm was torn off at the elbow and flung with great force across the room.

Above the elbow it was badly crushed and the large bone protruded through the flesh. He was taken to the hospital here and the physicians found it necessary to amputate a large portion of what remained of his arm. The injured man is an Assyrian, but has lived in Smith's Falls for several years.

Mrs. Merritt Dead.
St. Catharines, Ont., Jan. 7.--Mrs. Merritt, widow of Thomas R. Merritt, the late president of the Imperial bank, died, Monday morning, after a long illness. She was nearly eighty years of age, and was a sister of Judge Benson, of Port Hope.

THE STEAMER IN PORT

Information at First Quite Hazy--Is at Queenstown.

Liverpool, Jan. 7.--The Spanish steamer Vivenia, which arrived here last night, from Penacola, reported sightings on Jan. 3rd, 250 miles off Fastnet, Ireland, a steamer resembling the long over-due Canadian Pacific liner Mount Royal. The Vivenia was unable to ascertain the name or to read the signals of the supposed Mount Royal. Officials of the Canadian Pacific railway, at Liverpool, are confident that the steamer sighted by the Mount Royal and have decided to

send the steamer Lake Manitoba in search of her, assuming that she is a cripple by reason of broken machinery.

Arrived At Queenstown.
Montreal, Jan. 7.--The C.P.R. steamer Mount Royal arrived at Queenstown, Ireland, this morning, being thirty days over-due.

The long overdue Mount Royal entered the harbor, to-day, under easy steam.

Recomes A Company.
London, Jan. 7.--It is officially announced that negotiations are going on to make the Times a limited liability company, with A. E. Walter, now chief proprietor of the paper, as chairman, and C. A. Pearson, the well-known newspaper man, as managing director. The editorial character of the Times will not be changed.

Likely of Heart Failure.
Rochester, N.Y., Jan. 7.--A woman, about thirty-one years old, died in a Main street electric car, on Saturday afternoon, presumably of heart disease. Yesterday her body, after lying in the morgue for two days, was identified as that of Mary A. Ryan, recently of Cobourg. An inquest and autopsy will be held by the coroner.

MODIFY THEIR DEMANDS STRICTER RULES MADE

Or Else the English Cotton Mills Will Soon Negotiations Proceeding in a Very Cordial Manner.

London, Jan. 7.--The Tokio correspondence of the Despatch says that Japan has issued stricter administrative instructions with the object of completely prohibiting undesirable emigration. Mr. O'Brien, the American ambassador, in an interview, said that he was gratified with his negotiations with the government. They were proceeding in the most cordial manner. He criticized the non-success of Japan's past restrictive measures to the failure of subordinate officials to comply with their instructions.
