#### FOR LOCAL OPTION.

Recount in Pittsburgh Gives Majority of 6.

A recount just made, on the local option vote in Pittsburgh township, gives a majority of six, in favor of local option.

"Had the voters been properly canvassed," said a Barrieffield man to the Whig to-day, "local option would have been easily defeated. I know of eight votes that could have been obtained, and all of them would have gone against local option. The men are employed in the city, but could not get the time from their business to walk over to Barrieffield to vote. The liquor vote was not properly canvassed."

#### SPRUNG A-LEAK.

Mishap to the Steamer Geo. C. Howe To-Day.

The steamer George C. Howe, lying at Richardson's elevator, sprung a leak this forenoon, and the stern part of the vessel was flooded. The bursting of a seacock is believed to have been the cause of the accident.

Quick work was done in looking after the boat, the work of pumping her out being speedily attended to. The vessel, the Donnelly on the other, and with steam from the elevator engine, the pumps were soon at work.

#### IRRIGATION OF LANDS.

Government Leaves Something to Individual Enterprise.

Ottawa, Jan. 10.—A discussion on irrigation in the west and consideration of the accounts of the department of marine and fisheries occupied the bulk of the time of the house yesterday. Three and a half hours were spent over an appropriation of \$129,000 by the department provided over by Mr. Brodeur, the opposition making a concerted attack on the minister of marine and fisheries on the ground of extravagance, particularly in regard to his expenses connected with the colonial conference. Mr. Brodeur warmly resented the charge, and convicted Mr. Foster of misrepresentation. In a discussion on the irrigation bill, Mr. Bergeron urged upon the government the desirability of undertaking the work of irrigation, instead of leaving it to private enterprise. In reply to a question Sir Wilfrid Laurier stated that the government had no information as to a fresh influx of Japanese to British Columbia.

Hon. W. S. Fielding announced that his motion concerning the French treaty will come up for discussion on Tuesday next.

Sr. Wilfrid Laurier, answering Mr. Macdonell (Toronto), said that on July 27th, an order-in-council was passed authorizing the renewal of the contract with the Union Steamship company, of New Zealand, which does business between Vancouver and Australia. The contract had been forwarded for signature.

#### WAIVED EXTRADITION

Brought to St. Thomas to Answer Charges.

Toronto, Jan. 10.—Waiving extradition on a charge of theft of furs, Henry Cherry has been brought back to St. Thomas by the provincial detective department, and will stand his trial there. The furs were stolen last March from the Jones company, of St. Thomas, and afterwards a sale of furs was made to a wholesale house, by Henry Cherry and W. Moore, who received therefor \$115 and \$100. Cherry cashed the \$115 cheque at a hotel in London, and both men left the country. When Moore returned he was arrested, but Cherry remained in Detroit. Detective Rogers, of the provincial department, applied for an order for extradition but Cherry decided not to fight it, and has consequently been brought back to St. Thomas.
