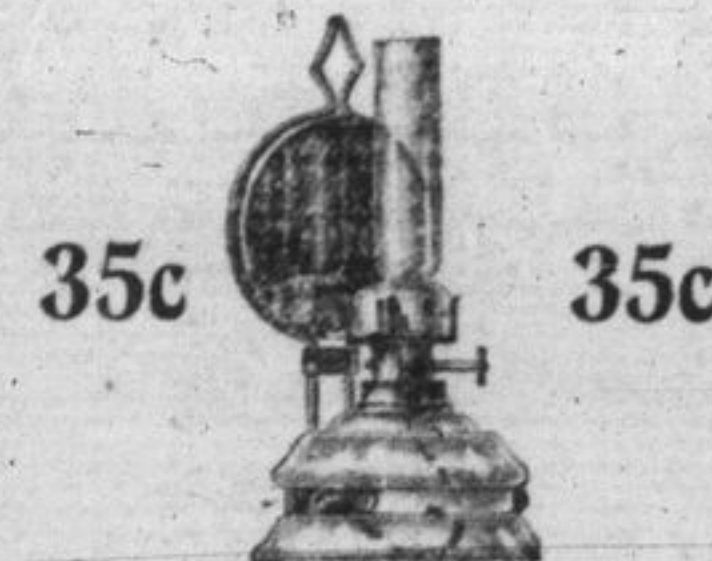

He also took a rap at the upper stratum of capitalist society by saying that the society column of the newspaper was not the standard of Ottawa or Dominion civilization.
