The Whitney government is said to contemplate a public utilities commission such as New York city and state possess. The present Ontario commission is not big enough for the issues of the hour.

The Canadian Courier says that the Ontario government does not go so far as the governments of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba in experimenting with public ownership. The western provinces will either build or buy (as Manitoba has done) the telephone lines. Ontario confines itself to the help of a commission to secure electric energy for the municipalities that ask for it at the lowest possible cost.

"This is not," says the Courier, "exactly public ownership, but the results are very much the same. The only difference is that the loss in experimenting or bad investing will fall on the municipal instead of on the provincial revenues. From this point of view it is rather a shrewd plan."

It is the one which eventually will not give satisfaction. The province will have to take some risk with the municipalities. This cannot be, under the law which constituted the commission, but the law can be changed if the government desire it. Once Mr. Beck made the plunge of promising this, but he was so quick in explaining it could not be, that the inference followed he had been called to account.

For the present the government is not to make it appear that it will do great things for the cities—at their expense.
