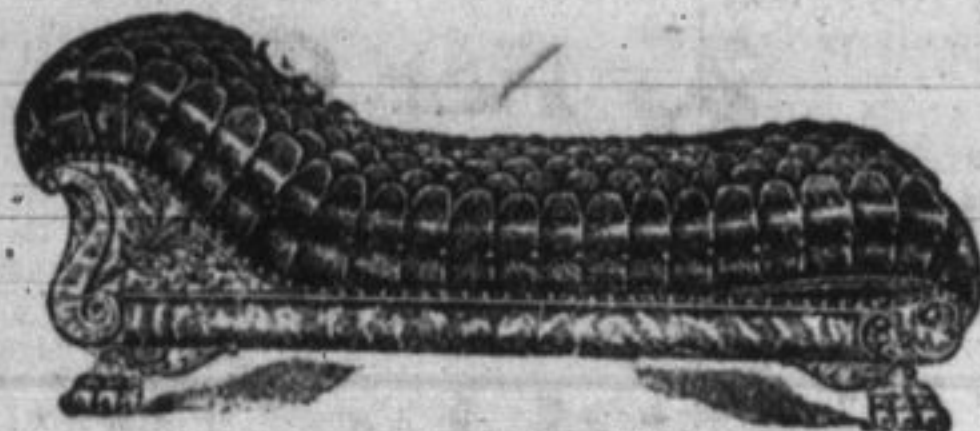

BANK TO LIQUIDATE BUSINESS TAKEN OVER BY OTHER INSTITUTIONS.

All Depositors Protected—Action Was Resolved on By Associated Bank Representatives. Toronto, Jan. 18.—Handicapped by a heavy load of liabilities handed down by its predecessors, the management of the Sovereign bank of Canada has found it economically impossible to weather the financial stringency, and, after thorough consideration and consultation with other banks, has decided to give up the fight and go into liquidation.

The agreement reached between the different banks with regard to the winding up of the Sovereign bank is different from that arrived at in the case of the Ontario bank. Instead of a single institution assuming entire charge of the situation, the branches of the Sovereign bank have been assigned to different banks, each of which will take charge of the accounts in the particular branch with which it is engaged.

By the returns to November 30th, the latest published, the bank's assets were valued at \$19,678,064, the liabilities to the public being put at \$16,583,107. There is thus a margin of over \$3,000,000 to the good.

The notes of the bank, as of all chartered banks in Canada, are secured by a fund deposited with the government of Canada.

Montreal, Jan. 18.—The Sovereign Bank, the liquidation of whose business commenced this morning, under the direction of the members of the Canadian Bankers' Association, had two offices in this city. The downtown business has been taken over by the Bank of British North America and the up-town by the Bank of Toronto.

Prof. R. M. Reynolds, for thirty years an educator in Wisconsin and Minnesota, died in an hospital at Morgantown, Pa.

Henry Charlton, the negro alleged to have attempted to burn a mill in Sandwich South, has been acquitted by Judge McHugh.

Gen. Stoesel has appealed to the court against discrimination against him on the part of the court-martial, which is trying him.

The Grand Trunk railway system's traffic earnings from January 8th to January 14th were: 1908, \$631,886; 1907, \$708,754; decrease, \$136,868.

Joseph Boyle, the Klondyke miner, who won a half million dollar suit against Detroit capitalists interested in the Canadian Klondyke Mining company, has put in a bill for witnesses' fees, amounting to \$4,100.

The Detroiters decline to settle the bill without a contest.

It is conceded among the financiers of Japan that the difficulties in the budget are entirely due to two causes—over-expenditure for the army, the navy and the nationalization of railroads, which is now considered by some to have been a vital error in national finance.

ARE VERY COMPLICATED

JAMES G. WARNOCK MAY HAVE TWO WIVES.

Legal Action Taken to Establish the Authority of the Alleged First Marriage—Daughters Remembered.

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 18.—James G. Warnock, formerly a prosperous baker in Ottawa, who died in Brockville, on January 11th, seems to have left complications behind him. For many years he lived with a woman who was respected as his wife, and the mother of his four children. In October last, however, he surprised the city by marrying his shop assistant, and they went to live in Brockville. His will leaves the daughters of the first woman \$5,000 apiece, and the wife of October last, the residue of the estate. Now the woman who lived with him in Ottawa turns up from Water town, N.Y., with a marriage certificate, stating that she was married to Warnock at Ogdensburg in 1891. Legal action is being taken to establish the authority of the alleged first marriage.

BANK OF COMMERCE.

Annual Report Shows a Wonderful Growth.

The annual meeting of the Canadian Bank of Commerce usually brings out something new, and its record did not lag this year. At Tuesday's meeting the shareholders passed a by-law authorizing an increase in the capital stock from \$10,000,000 to \$15,000,000. The Commerce aspires to be on a level with the Bank of Montreal. It wants to be in a position to handle big business, and with the development of this country there will be lots of room for its enterprise. The general manager, in his address, said: "The net profits of the Bank of Commerce for the year were over 17 1/2 per cent, and exceed those of last year by \$11,224. We have during the year," he stated, "paid four quarterly dividends of 2 per cent, or at the rate of 8 per cent per annum, and after deducting the large sum of \$350,000 for expenditures on bank premises, and making the usual provision for the pension fund, we have carried forward a balance of \$675,912.10 at credit of profit and loss account. Now that the cost of the bank equals the sum of fifty per cent of the paid-up capital, our recommendation will be that transfers to that account be made in even millions and that in the meantime the unappropriated profits should be carried forward at the credit of the profit and loss account.

"Our deposits during the year show a small decrease, namely \$111,000. The decrease is altogether in deposits not bearing interest, which are composed of the fluctuating balances of various business communities and are, therefore, in the nature of things subject to rapid changes. A year ago we pointed out that some of the deposits then held were of a temporary character, and we deem it proper to say that at the close of this year also a considerable amount came under this category. In common with other banking institutions, a real shrinkage of deposits will probably result through withdrawals of money which, but for the present emergency of trade, would remain with us. On the other hand our deposits bearing interest, being those of a more stable character, have increased during the year \$1,564,000." The annual report is published in the Whig to-day and is worthy of careful perusal.

Town Wants Its Money.

Toronto, Jan. 18.—The town of Gananoque bonused the Canada Cabinet company, a few years ago, to the extent of \$10,000. It failed some time ago, and the town foreclosed a mortgage which it had taken for that amount. The other assets were sold for \$10,000, of which the local judge ordered \$10,000 to be retained in court to secure the town. The liquidator has applied for leave to pay off of the town's claim. The unsecured creditors objected. Justice Riddell reserved judgment.
