FROM PICTON TOWN

A CONSCIENCE STRICKEN YOUTH PAYS FEE.

A Lad Injured While Sleigh-Riding—Mayor Clapp Advocates New Streets and a Public Park.

Pictou, Jan. 21.—In his inaugural address, before town council, Mayor Clapp advocated the opening of new streets and the securing of a desirable public park. He thinks that the question of sewerage must be kept a live issue until a proper sewerage system for the sanitation of Pictou is an assured fact. He further intimated that he would urge the dominion government to acquire the Pictou harbor, as was done in 1899. The only important business item at the meeting was the appointment of the following officers:

Auditors, Milton Adams and N. O. Fraser, tax collector, T. Wainwright, medical health officer, Dr. W. Wright; board of health, F. Terwilliger; library board, Rev. William Shearer, two years; and J. P. Blakeley, three years; fire chief, H. N. Babbitt.

Bog was resigning from the secretary-treasurership after twenty-eight years active service for the society. Montreal, Jan. 20.—About 1,553 head of butchers' cattle, 91 calves, 323 sheep and lambs, and 525 fat hogs were offered for sale at the Point St. Charles stockyards this forenoon. The butchers were not strong, but trade was slow, as higher prices were asked all round, excepting hogs, which are lower.

Reveries Electric Light. Venice, Jan. 21.—All the artists in Venice, besides the best known and most influential people in society, are up in arms for the defence of Venice's moonlight. It must be explained that this esthetic campaign is the result of a decision by the Venetian municipality to light the Grand canal, St. Mark's square and other canals by incandescent gas burners. It is not denied that the present system of lighting is scanty and inefficient, yet the artists and their supporters are vigorously condemning the suggested improvement.

Incandescent gas light, they say, gives a blending of crude light which would utterly destroy the beautiful colors for which Venice by moonlight enjoys world-wide fame. Already a petition has been forwarded to the municipal authorities asking them to rescind their order. Among the signatories are artists, poets and writers, including several English people who have settled in Venice.

Toronto World. In Toronto young women of talent, education and physical attractiveness, are asking for what is nothing more nor less than charity. They are finding that the business world is without sentiment and now that conditions are somewhat quiet, as a result of the financial stringency, they cannot find employment to suit them. Hence they ask favors here and there from their friends and relatives, in order to live.

It seems regrettable that bright, young women should take such a wrong view of life, that rather than do a kind of work which is offering every opportunity they will resort to practical begging. This kind of work is plain, ordinary, everyday house work. Their mothers did it before them, are doing it now. Their grandmothers did it, and great-grandmothers before them. It is honest employment, entirely respectable and is generously remunerative.

Scores of homes in this city are searching everywhere for domestic help. They cannot get it at any reasonable figure. Still the young women who want to live and keep their purity and womanhood ignore these opportunities. They would rather ask for small amounts of money, would either go to every large store and factory in Toronto, asking for a position, than take service in a fine home at a good wage.

These young ladies are under the opinion that if they do domestic work the community in which they are acquainted will place them on a low plane socially. What if it does? What if society at large says it is better to stand all day or toil in a shop or factory at from \$3 to \$6 a week than to go into a splendid home at \$15 a month, including board and washing? Society never buys you any bread. It never clothes you. It never protects your name from scandal and gossip. Why, then, listen to its vain, idle, frothy talk? Whether our system of education is wrong or whether our home life needs improving it is certain that some influences have misdirected the views of young women on this important matter.
