QUEEN'S II WON AGAIN

DEFEATED THE CADETS BY 13 TO 6.

Won the Round By 18 to 8—Changes in the Soldiers' Team Did Not Strengthen It As Was Expected.

Queen's II won the first round of the intermediate intercollegiate series, by defeating Cadets I, at the Kingston rink, on Wednesday evening. The score at half time stood 9 to 3 for Queen's, and at a full 18 to 6. The cadets were outplayed all through the game and the changes they made in their team did not benefit them much. During the first half the game was quite fast, the first two goals going to cadets, but they seemed to go to pieces after that, and the last part of the game was a walk-over for Queen's. Queen's defence put up a fine game. Hazlett and Donahue doing great work. Their forwards worked together better than they did the first game, and some fine rushes were features of the game. For the soldiers Green and Holt were the stars. At point Holt put up a good, strong game, and succeeded in connecting with some good ones. McLennan did not appear to be in as good form as he was on Friday night, but made some fine stops. The teams lined up as follows:

Referee—Noble Steacy. Timers—Cadet Lawrence, S. Mills. Penalty—Edward Dobbin. The game was by no means as fast as intermediate games should be, or as fast as have been played in that series in past years. It was comparatively clean, very little deliberate dirty work being done.

Varsity And Queen's. On Friday evening local lovers of hockey will be able to witness one of the best games of the season, when Queen's and Varsity clash in their first game of the season. The two games played last Friday clearly show that the cup lies between these two teams and Queen's will put up a great battle to win. Both teams have been working hard all week. Queen's had a practice on Wednesday, and will hold a light workout to-day. The boys are bound to win. The team will probably be the same as gave McGill such a trimming last Friday in Montreal.

A Return Match. Arrangements have been made for a return basketball match here between the Y.M.C.A. teams of Watertown and Kingston, on February 7th. The Kingston boys met defeat on the occasion of their recent visit across the line, but will put forth every effort to win out in the second battle.

Games Being Played. Two city league hockey games were booked for to-day. At four o'clock the Frontenac Business College and Kingston Business College played at the Royal rink. The Blue Jays and Juniors and St. Georges Juniors will play at seven o'clock, to-night, on the same rink.

Sporting Items. The Prescott senior curling team meets the Kingston boys to-night in this city. City basketball will be on again next Tuesday night. Two games will probably be played. The Mic-Macs, a new city league team, have arranged a game with the Tigers of Gananoque to be played the early part of next week.

A meeting of the executive of the city basketball league will be held at the Y.M.C.A., on Friday evening, when several matters of importance will be considered. The local curlers are glad to see the curling season, as many games have yet to be played. The games with outside towns are also a little behind the scheduled dates, but will be played off in time.

Escaped in Night Dress. Toronto, Jan. 23.—Miss Larned, aged forty-five years, a nervous patient in the Western hospital, escaped from this institution, last night, and only in her night dress. She ran five blocks to the home of W. Ross, entering the kitchen by the back door and begged the inmates to protect her from the hospital authorities, declaring that seventy-five persons already had been killed there that day. She was wrapped in a blanket and taken back to the hospital in the ambulance.

To Break Warnock's Will. Brockville, Ont., Jan. 23.—Proceedings have been started to break the will of J. G. Warnock, the well-known Canadian horseman, who died here on the 11th inst., leaving a large estate. An Ottawa firm of lawyers has entered a caveat in the local surrogate court in opposition to granting probate of the will of the deceased. It is understood that Mrs. Warnock No. 1 is taking this course to assert her claim to a portion of the estate.

Satisfactory Report. Montreal, Jan. 23.—At the annual meeting of the Royal Bank of Canada, to-day, the report was considered satisfactory, and was adopted. H. S. Holt, vice-president, presided, in the absence of T. E. Kenny, Halifax, president. The directors were re-elected and at a subsequent meeting of directors, Mr. Kenny was re-elected president, and Mr. Holt vice-president.

Thaw Irrational. New York, Jan. 23.—When the trial of Harry Thaw opened, to-day, physicians and nurses, from London, Paris, and Rome were present to add to the defence by expressing opinions that Thaw was exceedingly irrational while in Europe with Evelyn Nesbit. Miss Lydia Fry dropped dead at a hotel in London, last night.

OH YOU NAUGHTY MAN!

WEDDED A DETROIT YOUNG WOMAN

And Represented Himself as a Lord—Gave Her Clothing Which He Didn't Pay For—Tried to Pass a Bad Check!

Walkerville, Ont., Jan. 23.—Word came from Detroit, Mich., that George T. Woodman, thirty years of age, a cabinet maker of Walkerville, is held at police quarters there, charged with being a suspicious person, but the real charge is said to be fraud. Woodman, according to the despatch, recently became acquainted with a Detroit young woman, to whom he represented himself as Lord Devonshire, of the English nobility. He was an ardent lover and the two were married, on Tuesday last. Woodman dazzled his bride by presenting her with \$300 worth of fine clothing purchased from a Detroit firm, which it is said is still unpaid for. Yesterday he visited a pawn shop and tried to cash a cheque for \$50, using his wife's bank-book as security. It is alleged the cheque was a forgery.

DR. CARL PETERS WON.

Correspondent Who Slandered Him Fined \$25. Cologne, Jan. 23.—Dr. Carl Peters, who was at one time governor of German East Africa, won his libel suit against R. Von Bennigsen, the Berlin correspondent of the Cologne Gazette. Dr. Peters charged that he had been libelled by certain published statements, alleging misconduct on his part in Africa. Herr Von Bennigsen was sentenced to pay \$25 damages and all costs of the suit, or go to jail for twenty days.

What is Going on in the Business World—The Markets.

Four million pounds' worth of talking machines are manufactured in Germany last year.

There are now 1,829 shareholders of Toledo railway, several hundred of whom are in Canada.

Various Canadian banks have united to tide the city of Winnipeg over its temporary money scarcity.

Important petroleum wells have been discovered at Carletonplace, Department of Calbuco, Southern Chili.

The production of the British Columbia Copper company for 1907 amounted to \$1,119,562 pounds of copper.

Bugald McKay, director of the Ontario Bank, denies all allegations set out in the shareholders' statement of claim against the directors.

The Pittsburgh Stock Exchange, which has been closed ever since the financial panic in New York last fall, will reopen next Monday.

H. G. Minor has retired from the directorate of the Canadian Consolidated Rubber company. He is still the largest holder in the securities of the Consolidated.

E. Mackay Edgar, formerly a member of the Montreal Stock Exchange, who now belongs to the larger banking firm of Spelling & Co., has been elected a member of the London Stock Exchange.

In view of the recent rumors that the C.P.R. might purchase the control of the Boston and Maine from the N. Y. N. H. and Hartford, it is interesting to note that a bill has just been introduced in the Massachusetts legislature forbidding the merger of the two U. S. roads.

The sales of farm lands by the Hudson's Bay company for the quarter ending December 31st, amounted to 2,200 acres for £6,000, compared with 12,000 acres for £12,000, and sales of town lots to £980, as compared with £1,500 for the corresponding period of 1906.
