## HUNTING GUN-NOOT

### BRITISH COLUMBIA INDIAN WANTED FOR SHOOTING.

The Pursuit Has Cost the Province Thirty Thousand Dollars—Fourteen Men Now Scouring the North Country For the Fugitive.

Vancouver, Jan. 23.—One of the most costly and laborious man-hunts that ever took place in Northern British Columbia is that after the Indian, Simon Gun-Noot, who a year ago last July shot Alexander McIntosh and Max Leclair and fled to the hills in the Bear Lake country. It is said that the chase is the longest ever maintained by any provincial government. Four parties have sought the fugitive in vain, and the expenditure in money has been over \$30,000. At present the expeditionary force consists of fourteen men, all old-timers in the interior. During the summer and fall months the provincial police at Hazelton prepared for the hunt, which has been prosecuted vigorously during the winter months. They had a pack team of fourteen horses steadily engaged conveying provisions, ammunition, etc., to the numerous caches they established. So far the only result of the hunt has been the capture of the Indian who has been trading the furs which Gun-Noot and his party have taken during their absence.

#### COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going on in the Business World—The Markets.

The earnings of the Montreal Street Railway company for the week ending January 18th, amounted to \$62,257.90, an increase of \$4,171.35 over the previous week.

The Premier Diamond Mining company, of London, announces a further reduction in the output of diamonds until the prevailing depression in the gem market is over.

During last year shipments from the Cobalt camp were 14,813.13 tons, a very considerable increase over those of the previous year. Some of the smaller mines started to send out ore.

Everything now points to the Drummond Mines company establishing smelting works in the vicinity of Bathurst, N.B., in connection with its recently acquired rich iron deposits at Grand Falls, on the Nipisiguit river.

Rodman Wanamaker carries more life insurance than any other person in America. His policies aggregate \$4,900,000. His father, John Wanamaker, is insured for \$1,500,000. The policies of President Roosevelt aggregate \$83,500.

#### THE SPORT REVIEW.

Interesting News From the Various Sporting Fields.

Sutton and Slosson are now tied in their billiard match, Sutton winning the sixth game at New York by 500 to 410.

The Vancouver Rowing Club expects to engage Charles Stephenson, the ex-New Zealander, now with Harvard to coach for the coming summer.

Ottawa Free Press: "Marty" Walsh has probably solved the hoodoo trouble. He has put his hand on every burp in town and Saturday will wear his sweater inside out and cross his fingers.

Ottawa will probably accept the terms offered them and the Montreal Wanderers for a match in Sherbrooke to open the new rink there on January 30th. The clubs have been offered \$1,000, sixty per cent to winners and forty per cent to losers.

The gate at Celtic Park, Glasgow, on New Year's Day, on the occasion of the football match between Celtic and Glasgow Rangers, amounted to £1,244, and stands £400 extra, which is a record for Scotland in a club match, and represents an attendance of 55,000.

The Eastern Baseball League season will open this year on Thursday, April 23rd, or Friday, April 24th. This is a couple of days earlier than usual, and just a week after Good Friday.

Toronto, will this year open in the east, a departure from last year, when they began at Rochester.

The Pittsburgh hockey league, a four-team combination, maintained by the management of the Duquesne rink, is apparently not financially satisfactory to Manager McSwiggan, and it is understood that one team, the P. A. C., will be dropped. Grindy Forester has taken time by the forelock, and gone to Winnipeg, Edgar Bey, of the Pirates is the latest player to be "canned."
