NEWS FROM QUEEN'S

NEW ARRANGEMENT ABOUT "Q" DISTRIBUTION.

President Falconer, of Toronto Lectured to the Theological Students This Morning—Other College News.

Secretary W. H. MacInnes, of the athletic committee, outlined the proposed new scheme of Q distribution at the A. M. S. meeting on Saturday evening, but in view of the fact that the attendance was not large, that the scheme was not matured and that the matter is one of grave importance, it will not be finally settled for two weeks. Next Saturday evening there will be distributed printed statements of the athletic committee's scheme and of suggestions which are deemed of sufficient merit to be submitted to the A. M. S. The athletic committee's proposal is, briefly as follows: The championship nine-inch gold Q will continue to symbolize championship and the rules governing its distribution will not be altered in the slightest. To members of the first teams in rugby football and hockey, who hold their positions for a specified number of games the A.M.S. will present five-inch gold Q's, within which will be the letters r, a, or h, signifying rugby, association or hockey, as the case may be. Individual champions and those who break records at the Queen's sports in the autumn will receive blue Q's, while the champions in boxing, fencing, wrestling and tennis will be presented with red Q's, containing the initial letter of the branch in which they excelled. This arrangement makes no provision for the basketball team, which represents the college in the recently organized Intercollegiate basketball league. In reply to a query Mr. MacInnes stated that the matter had not been finally settled, but that the basketball club would probably be ranked with the track club in the distribution of the Q's.

J. J. Harpell, B.A., a former business manager of Queen's University Journal, now business manager of the Canadian Mining Review, is renewing acquaintances at the university.

The year '08 defeated '09 in the weekly basketball game on Saturday afternoon. Oscar Gallagher, '10, was an impartial referee.

H. A. Connolly, M.A., who was business manager of the Journal last season, presented the annual financial report to the Alma Mater Society, on Saturday evening. The report, which was very satisfactory in every respect, showed a surplus for the session of \$160.

Says the Toronto News: "The official intelligence that the Grand Trunk telegraphers were to receive advances in their wages reached Toronto, yesterday, from the head office. This is the result of the negotiations recently carried on between the men and the company under Prof. Shortt."

The Alma Mater Society and the Arts, Engineering and Aesculapian Societies, have appointed representatives to the spinsters "At Home."

For the first time in the annals of the musical committee, the members of the clubs were so numerous that it was necessary to arrange two sittings, the orchestra and mandolin club being taken in the first, and the male glee club and ladies' glee club in the second.

PAIN SAVES A SUICIDE.

His Groans Heard By Men, Who Rescue Him.

Naples, Jan. 27.—An army officer here has just been saved from a suicide's death by the pain of the process. A victim to nerve collapse, he bought a poisonous sublimate tablet. He swallowed it, but very soon the excruciating pain drove him to the inclosed shelter in a public park. The attendants heard his groans and carried him off to the hospital. They found on the seat beside him his farewell letter, saying his nerves had made him end his life.

SULTAN FRIENDLY TO JEWS.

No Opposition to the Colonization of Palestine.

Berlin, Jan. 27.—David Wolfsohn, the president of the International Jewish Organization, states that the Sultan Abdul Hamid has adopted a more friendly attitude toward the Zionist movement.

The president was recently in Constantinople, and received assurance from the Turkish government which led him to the belief that the Turkish authorities would offer no more opposition to the colonization of Palestine by the Jews.

He says: "We ourselves shall see in our lifetime the realization of our Zionist ideal."

Wealth of French Monks.

Paris, Jan. 27.—Twenty-seven members of the senate have been formed into a committee to investigate the report by the late minister of justice in which the liquidation of the properties and the monasteries of the monks is stated to have been attended with extravagance.

There is, however, no proof that the property of the congregations was worth the enormous sum of \$200,000,000, which public rumor ascribes to it, and there is every possibility that a fairly clear account of the property will be rendered by the senate investigating committee.

Leamington, Ont., Jan. 27.—Near Glenwood, in Romney township, Kent county, has been sunk the most productive gas well in Ontario. It has the enormous pressure of 600 pounds, and, therefore, will produce over seven million feet of gas in twenty-four hours.
