BIG STORM IN OTTAWA

A SWINDLER DISCOVERED
BY A PRIEST.

He Had Secured Money From the
Father, But Was Finally
Caught—Ottawa Street
Railway Dividend of Twelve Per
Cent.

Ottawa, Jan. 27.—Ottawa to-day is
experiencing the worst snow and wind
storm of the season, and the district
roads are badly blocked. About seven
inches of snow has fallen, and it has
been drifted by a wind going twenty
miles an hour. Fortunately, however,
the temperature has not reached low-
er than about seven degrees above
zero. The Ottawa electric railway has
maintained a continuous service, and
the steam trains are arriving from
half an hour to two hours late.

Edward McEvoy was arrested here
yesterday, on a charge of swindling
Canon Slonn of St. Bridget's church.
The priest had been deceived by a
hard-luck story, and obtained finan-
cial help. Then he got the priest on the
telephone, and posing as H. B.
Spencer of the C. P. R., told the
priest to advance him anything he
wanted. The swindler holding himself
responsible. The swindler went on for
several weeks until Canon Slonn hap-
pened to ring up the real Mr. Spen-
cer, and discovered the fraud.

The Ottawa Electric Railway com-
pany's receipts last year were \$74,378,
an increase over 1906 of \$18,531. The
number of passengers carried was
12,623,440 or 1,215,218 more than in
the previous year. The company de-
clared a dividend of twelve per cent.

CITY OF SUICIDES

More Than One Per Day During
Last Year.
Vienna, Jan. 27.—Three hundred
and fifty-six men and 108 women com-
mitted suicide in Vienna last year.
This is an increase of thirty-nine per
cent over the previous year, and enhances
the reputation of the city for a pre-emin-
ence in suicides among all the cap-
itals of Europe. Further, 441 men and
298 women unsuccessfully attempted to
take their lives.

Asking For Big Sum.

Windsor, Ont., Jan. 27.—A deputa-
tion from Rochester township waited
on Hon. Dr. Reame, minister of pub-
lic works, here, on Saturday, and asked
that the government set aside
\$7,000 to carry out a new drainage
scheme in the township. The plan
contemplates the opening of the Rus-
combe river for a distance of about
three miles above the point where the
work of the dominion government will
stop.
