## PERSONAL MENTION

At the Christian and Missionary Alliance Meeting.

Rev. Isaac Hess, returned missionary from China, was the first speaker at last evening's meeting of the Christian and Missionary Alliance, in Bethel church. His address was exceedingly instructive, and speaking as he did from the vantage ground of one who had been an eye-witness of that which he so graphically portrayed, made it all the more interesting to those who heard him. He dwelt cheerfully on the fact that the greater part of China is rapidly opening up to the preaching of the gospel. In nearly every Chinese home it is customary to have from one to ten gods. These are worshipped, not because the people love them, but rather with the hope of appeasing their wrath. It was significant, however, that during the past two years more than ten thousand temples in China had been torn down, and that fully twice that number of idols had also been destroyed. There was a great responsibility resting upon the Christians of this land, and they should see to it that this God-given opportunity of evangelizing China is not neglected. "We are debtors," said he, "to a lost world to give men the gospel, and every right-thinking man and woman believes that it is dishonourable not to pay one's debts."

At the conclusion of Mr. Hess' address, the Stephen brothers, of Toronto, sang a missionary hymn, after which Dr. Wilson made a fervent appeal to the Christian people before him to respond to the crying needs of China's millions. The great heart of Jesus Christ had gone out to that unhappy people, and to all that love the Saviour's name there came the cry, "Follow the heart of Jesus." Surely the response should not be less real than that made by Douglas, of Scottish history, who, to rouse the courage and enthusiasm of his followers in a great battle with the Moors, threw the silver casket containing the heart of Jesus into the midst of his enemies, and calling upon all who loved that heart to follow him, led them unto victory. The closing meeting of the convention will be held this evening.

**OPENED PARLIAMENT.**  
A Clear and Sunny Day For the Procession.

London, Jan. 29.—That most rare event of a London winter, a clear and sunny day, favored the royal procession, to-day, to Westminster, where King Edward opened parliament and with the same ceremonies that have been observed for centuries. His majesty, in his speech, referred to the visit of the German emperor which, he said, could not fail to confirm the friendly relations existing between the two powers; to the death of King Oscar of Sweden and to the conclusion of the Russian agreement. Acting in the spirit of this agreement in spite of the complications in Persia, the two governments had maintained a policy of peace.

**A PITIFUL EPILOGUE.**  
Dogs and Faithful Maid Followed Ouida to Grave.

Florence, Jan. 29.—The funeral of "Ouida," yesterday, was a most pitiful epilogue to her pitiful end. She died amid squalor and poverty, and her body was followed to the grave only by a dozen dogs she had starved her maid, and her faithful maid, to whom she left her last manuscripts. The body was buried in the English cemetery at Bagni di Lucca, and the spot is marked only by a wooden cross.

**Riddled With Bullets.**  
London, Jan. 29.—A news agency despatch, from Teheran, says a Persian mob surrounded the governor's palace, yesterday, demanding the surrender to them of Amir Rezag, who murdered his brother at Yazd last week. The governor refused, whereupon the mob forced an entrance to the palace and released all the prisoners except Rezag, whom they riddled with bullets. The police were powerless.

**Once Pastor, Now Conductor.**  
St. Joseph, Mo., Jan. 29.—J. W. O'Bryant, who has been pastor of the Hyde Park Methodist church, has resigned to become a street car conductor on a suburban line here. He says he can make more money as a conductor than as a preacher and do more good.

Renewed conflicts between the constitutionalists and the reactionists have broken out at Tabriz, and twenty persons have been reported killed. There have been also disorders at Yerd.
