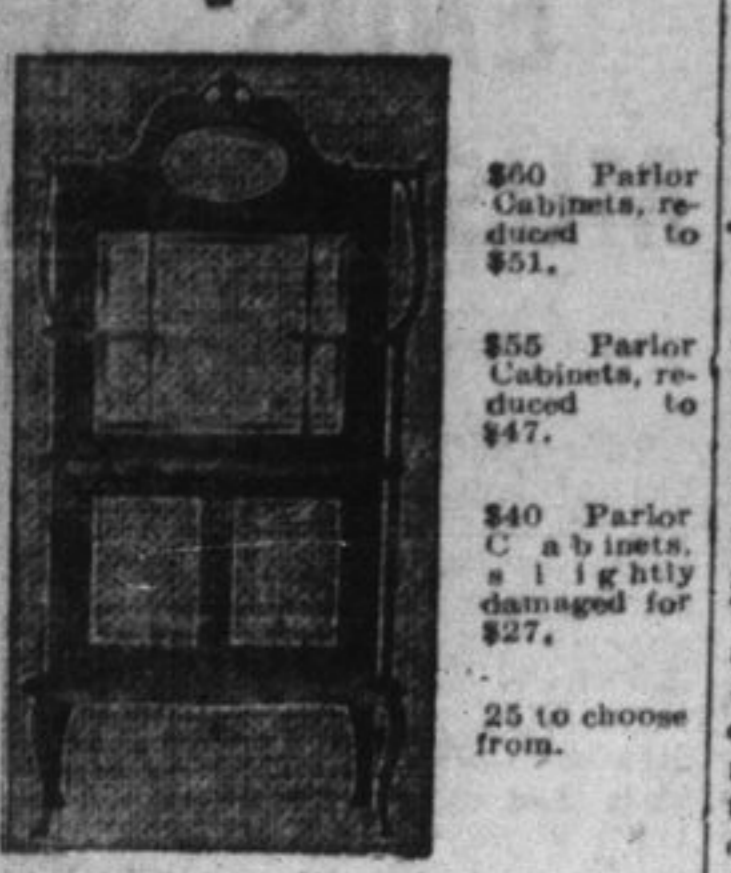

OUR MISSIONARY WORK FRONTENAC'S FINANCES

ADDRESS OF PASTOR STEPHENS, OF TORONTO. AUDITOR T. D. MINNES MAKES HIS REPORT.

Points Out the Work Which Should Be Carried Out at Home—The Many Opportunities for Service.

At the closing session of the Christian and Missionary Alliance convention, at Bethel church, last night, Pastor Stephens, of Toronto, delivered an address on missionary work, making a strong appeal for the carrying on of the mission work in foreign fields. The speaker referred particularly to the work to be accomplished at home, in the way of giving financial assistance and rendering service, and his address was a most forceful one.

In his opening remarks, the speaker pointed out that the success in the foreign field, depended very largely upon the work which was accomplished at home. There must be support and help on the part of the workers at home. A great missionary had been asked, upon one occasion, what would be the greatest discouragement she could receive concerning her work in the far-off heathen land, and her reply was this: "The greatest discouragement could be conveyed to me in the news that the church at home was not interested in missionary work." The speaker looked forward to a great revival in missionary effort; the heathen lands were open for the gospel, and it was the duty of the Christian church at home, to see that God's message was delivered there. The opportunities were many, and God was challenging us to take up the work. It was to be deeply regretted that interest was lacking. There appeared to be criminal ignorance in regard to the needs of mission work abroad. The question was one that called for a broader and more systematic study. "To know is to give and to go," added the speaker. Many Christians knew very little about Christ's work in heathen lands, and this was to be regretted. On the other hand, however, there was just cause for rejoicing for the good which had been accomplished.

Reference was made to the good work along missionary lines, accomplished by the students' volunteer movement, and the laymen's missionary movement. The students' movement was organized in 1888, and rapid strides had been made. Since this movement had been set on foot, some four thousand students had responded to the call to foreign lands, and many others were, to-day, preparing themselves for active work in the field. The young people's movement, organized five years ago, had for its object the training of young people to take an active part in missionary work. It would be impossible to estimate the value of this movement. Ministers had testified to the marked effect it had upon the prayer meetings. The young people became interested in the work, and as a result, thousands caught the missionary spirit. The speaker hoped that this spirit would continue to spread, until the young people of the world over had become interested in the work. Marvellous work had been accomplished as a result of the laymen's missionary movement, organized just a year ago. Bible study men had commenced to take an interest in the work, and men were being dispatched to foreign lands, to size up the situation. Already sixty-five men had been sent out, and each one at his own expense. Christian business men had been shown the various opportunities for service. Reference was made to the good work of different religious bodies, along missionary lines, during the past few years. The sum of \$500,000 had been secured by the laymen's movement, in Toronto, for foreign missions. Worldwide prayer was needed, with the financial help, to accomplish the work. Mothers should rock their children in the missionary cradle, and there would be many recruits. A great deal of money was lost in different speculations, which could be put to very good service in missionary work.

At the close of Pastor Stephens' address, Rev. Isaac Hess, returned missionary from China, who delivered such an interesting address on Tuesday evening, spoke briefly. There was a good attendance at the meeting. It was announced that meetings would be held in Calvary Congregational church, Thursday and Friday, afternoon and evening sessions.

THE CADETS WON AGAIN THE HALLS OF QUEEN'S KEEP THE DIALS LIT

AND WILL NOW MEET QUEEN'S JUNIORS. DIVINITY AND SCIENCE TO PLAY BASKETBALL.

McCammon of the K.C.I. Had His Ankle Badly Cut—The Frontenacs Hope to Defeat St. Georges To-Morrow.

Permanent Secretary for Y.M.C. A—A Fine Landscape Painting May Be Purchased For The Consulting Library.

All Night Instead of Only Part—He Scores His Point—City Quarry Lots on Patrick Street to Be Sold.

The city property committee met yesterday afternoon. There were present: Ald. Angrove (chairman), Cooper, Graham, Toye, McCartney and Free.

An offer of \$115 was received for lot 708 on the east side of Nelson street from George Laturney. On motion of Ald. Graham, the offer was accepted.

The communication of R. Wallace, offering \$900 for the city's six quarry lots on Patrick street, or \$400 for the two front ones was considered. Ald. McCartney said he wouldn't favor selling the front two. If any sale is to be made let all the lots be sold in bulk.

Ald. Graham thought that at least \$1,000 should be got for the lots. He moved that Mr. Wallace be offered the six lots for that figure.

Ald. Toye wanted to know if the quarry lots had been properly offered for sale by being advertised. The chairman said that they had not, but the question of selling them had been discussed for some months past. Mr. Wallace owned lots on each side, and quarry lots were more valuable to him than anyone else.

The city engineer stated that the city had several other better quarry lots than those on Patrick street, and that if it hadn't acquired the Allen lots on Montreal street, it would have quarried stone for the streets of some of its other lots where the stone was closer to the surface.

The motion of Ald. Graham to sell the six lots for \$1,000 was adopted. Chairman Angrove stated that there were still lots of work to be done on the city buildings, to get them into proper repair. One important place was around the dome, where repairs must be done very soon. He suggested that a sub-committee be appointed to go over the city buildings and report upon what was necessary. So that the finance committee would know in good time what amount of money the buildings required.
