No Ground For Objection.

Regarding the Perth toll road by-law, providing for sixteen miles of road, County Councillor Stoney says there is no ground for any objection. The old Perth Road covered only twenty miles, but in order to secure the government grant for good roads, the Perth highway had to be made part of a connecting system. Hence four more miles were added, making sixteen in all. Last year's county council passed the by-law as sanctioned by the Ontario department of public works. The extent of the road is clearly defined in the by-law.
