HIGH EXPLOSIVES. An Expert Upon This Kind of Goods.



Prof. Charles E. Munroe, the greatest living authority on high explosives, has just undertaken a line of investigation which it is hoped will prove of benefit to a large proportion of the American people and will, ultimately, no doubt, save thousands of lives. Prof. Munroe will seek by means of a series of tests and investigations to discover what explosives are best adapted for use in mining

operations. It is no secret that a majority of the terrible disasters which occur in American coal mines—and particularly harrowing examples of which have lately been presented in West Virginia and Pennsylvania—are due directly or indirectly to the use of charges of dynamite or other explosives to break down the coal. Gradually it has come to be realized that some explosives are much less liable than others to induce the explosions of coal dust or fire damp that snuff out the lives of hundreds of miners in an instant, but detailed information has been lacking as to just which of the explosives is "safest." Prof. Munroe will endeavor to clear up this point, and it is expected that as a result of his work there will be passed a national law governing the use of high explosives.

Latest French Styles.

Striped materials continue being fashionable, and the woman who needs a gown which she can wear for a long time need have no hesitancy in selecting a striped silk or striped voile. Skirts are long and extremely close fitting over the hips. The trimming is all toward the foot. Even such flimsy materials as tulle and chiffon cloth are often made up with a band of velvet at the bottom. Veiled effects are fashionable, and the skirts of latest evening gowns show lovely changing effects. For example: a skirt of pale blue chiffon will be made up over a pale blue silk or satin foundation, but to give it an unusual little touch there will be another chiffon skirt between the outer one and the silk foundation, and this will not be of blue.

SWORE AT MAGISTRATE

AND WAS GIVEN ANOTHER YEAR ON HIS TERM.

James Cameron, of "A" Battery, Sentenced to Two Years in Central For Theft of Pair of Boots—Lively Scene in Court. In the police court this morning, the case of James Cameron, a member of "A" battery, accused of stealing a pair of boots, was resumed. Ernest Blackman, the batteryman who lost the shoes was again called, and told about his boots being taken from his room at the barracks. He identified the boots produced in court, as belonging to him. The boots were the regular military boots. Alfred Smith, who when sworn the other day, said that he had bought the shoes from Cameron, was again called, and gave the same evidence as he did upon that occasion. The accused was sworn. He said that upon the night the boots were stolen, he was with Blackman, in the barracks, at the barracks, from 7 o'clock until 5 o'clock, with the exception of about ten minutes. Witness did not think that this was sufficient time for him to have gone to Blackman's room, and taken the boots. It was 7.30 o'clock, when he left the barracks, and inside the barracks gate he met a man named Graves, who is an ex-member of "A" battery, who was dressed in plain clothes and asked him if he wanted to buy a pair of boots. The accused said that he did not want to buy the boots, but told Graves so. "I then took the boots to Smith," said Cameron, "and sold them to him for one dollar. I then went back to Graves and gave him the money." Charles Dixon, a witness called, stated that he knew the man Graves, referred to by Cameron. Graves was his son-in-law. Witness did not think that Graves was in town. "What makes you think that he is out of the city?" asked the court. "Because if he was here, I believe that he would go and see his wife and family."

Witness further stated that on September 26th last, Graves told him that he intended going back to the lumber shanties, in Michigan. There was nothing to make witness believe that there was any trouble between Graves and his wife. Witness had not heard of Graves' whereabouts since he left Kingston.

This concluded the evidence, and the magistrate, in summing up the case, said that he had not the slightest doubt in his own mind as to who the guilty party was. The guilty man was the prisoner Cameron. The magistrate said that the prisoner's story about the man Graves, was of a very flimsy nature. His story all the way through, was not the story of a reasonable man.

The magistrate reviewed the case in detail, and said that, as he had no doubt in his own mind as to who the guilty party was, he would sentence him to one year in the Central prison. "It's all a lie," said Cameron, as he was leaving the prisoner's dock for the cells.

The prisoner's face was white with rage, and just as he was near the door, being led away by Constables Bateson and Arnie, he turned to Magistrate Farrell and cried out: "It is a lie, and you are a liar too."

"Bring that man back here," said the court to the officers whereupon Cameron was again arraigned in the prisoner's box. "I will make your sentence two years instead of one," said the court, and then Cameron was led away. He had nothing more to say. An officer stated to the Whig after the case, had been concluded, that citizens should take warning from this case, and not buy boots of military accoutrements from soldiers, as the soldiers had no right to dispose of these things.

John Cooper admitted being drunk, but said that he had taken the liquor because he was out working in the deep snow all day. A fine of \$1 and costs, or ten days, was the penalty imposed.

Case Was Adjudged. William McKelroy, of Pittsburgh township, is charged by George Eaton, of the same place, with assault. The case was sent for hearing before Justice of the Peace Hunter, this afternoon, but as the defendant did not appear, an appearance, a warrant was issued for his arrest. On Wednesday, at 2 p.m., the assault is alleged to have taken place on January 29th. One of the witnesses also failed to put in an appearance, and he will be served with another one.

A Toe Crushed. John Barton, Bagot street, an employee of the Canadian Locomotive Works, suffered a severe accident, on Saturday morning. An axle, weighing about 14,000 pounds, fell on his left foot, crushing the big toe very badly and the next toe was also severely injured. He was removed to the Hotel Dieu, where Dr. Anglin dressed his injuries. Dr. Anglin stated, this morning, that he hoped to save the toe.

Edward Goldberg was charged, before the police magistrate, Toronto, on Monday morning, with conspiracy to defraud of a number of wholesale merchants of Toronto out of \$5,000 worth of goods. Two other men, named Moewis and Reed, at present in the old country, are in the mesh. Several boy skaters had a narrow escape from death by the collapse of the roof of Bowler's Arena at Picton. Joseph Grooms, caretaker, who warned the boys, was caught under falling timbers, but not seriously injured. The railway situation in Ontario shows some improvement although most of the trains are still running behind time while others are cancelled. William Eif, the yacht designer, was seriously injured at his shipyard, near Glasgow, by falling into the hold of Sir Thomas Lipton's new racing yacht.
