PROF. J. CLARK MURRAY PREACHED IN CONVOCA-TION HALL YESTERDAY.

If We Are to Have a Workable Society, We Must Ultimately Adopt the Doctrines of Christ.

A logical and profound discourse was that delivered at Queen's Convocation services, yesterday afternoon, by Prof. J. Clark Murray, LL.D., professor of moral philosophy at McGill University.

In this utterance of Christ the verb "will" was an independent verb, implying a voluntary effort of some kind, not a mere auxiliary verb employed to express futurity.

Did Christ's teachings emanate from God or from Himself? Truth must be the statement in question was one coming from the infinite intelligence, while falsehood was that which was spun out of the consciousness of an imperfect or finite intelligence.

When men strove to conceive of a thing beyond any intelligence it was but a fiction of abstraction—a mere nothing. Reality or truth was not beyond the reach of all intelligence, as the very etymology of the term truth firmly established without aid from other sources.

It was in view of this limitation, how could learning make any progress whatever? We should strive to put ourselves at the point of view of the divine intelligence, with which we were in communion more or less at all times.

We would be enabled to know whether Christ's teachings were of God or of Himself. All truth was tested by action of some sort, and no theory was accepted ere it had been submitted to this test.
