

The great fleet was that of the Duke of Savoy, who at the beginning of the fourteenth century maintained a number of war galleys armed with rams and protected by turrets and propelled by a cnew of oarsmen varying in number from forty to seventy-two. These vessels besieged Versolx and even blockaded Geneva. But Geneva also had a fleet which helped in the capture of Chilon in 1536, and when the Bernese annexed the canton of Vaud they, too, had their flotilia. Next came a soup of seaweed, bitter, salty, decidedly good; next an assortment of nuts boiled in soy; pext salt relishes; next delicious boiled rice, the grains as large as cherries, and, to conclude, tea again.
