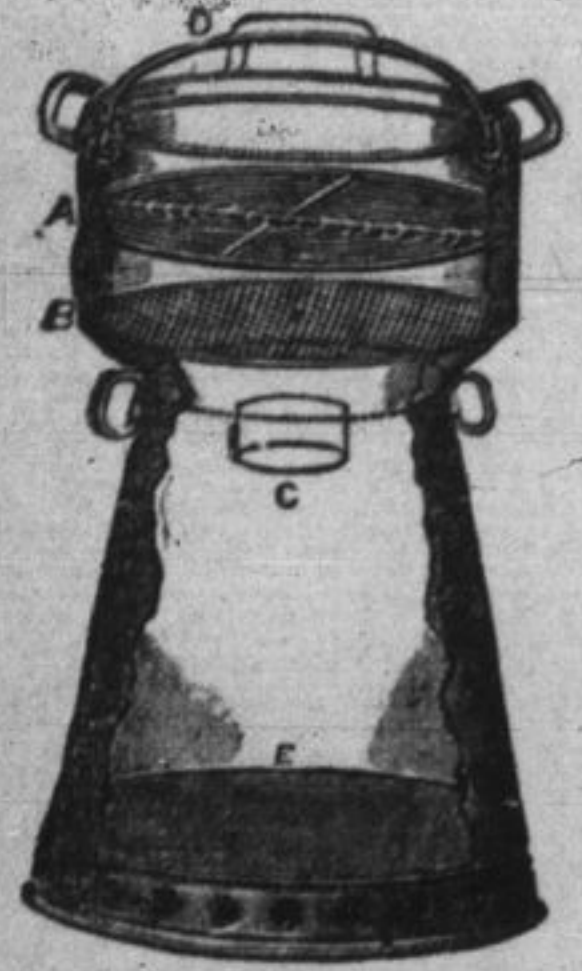

MISJUDGING THE PEOPLE. The Montreal Gazette has it that no one at Victoria or Ottawa—the representatives of two governments—carries for the British government. This is the conclusion because the federal government is reported to be indisposed to veto the British Columbia anti-Asiatic immigration bill.

A PROBING IS NEEDED.

If there is ground for contending that the people's affairs in the city could be managed more economically and more successfully there is the greater ground for concluding that the people's affairs in the county could be improved by a change.

First, it is alleged that the revenues of the county from taxation are inadequate. Every year there is a forecasting as to the wants of the county. A budget is prepared. Does it show everything? Is there upon the face of the document the information to which the people are entitled—that the business of the county is being carefully and economically administered?

When the court house, a little while ago, was refitted or refurbished how were the expenses incurred? Was there a plan or specification for all details? Were tenders invited, and the lowest for a specific work or contract accepted in every case? Or was there not a distribution of patronage among political friends, and with the result that until the accounts were called in there was very little known as to what their totals would be?

ONTARIO LEGISLATURE.

(Continued from Page 1.) over by the Dominion government, thus making it possible for the provincial government to devote more attention to the careful selection of desirable settlers.

A demonstration farm has been established at Drottwood River, north of the height of land, in a good agricultural country. By experiment in crop raising conducted there, much practical information will be gained for the use of intending settlers.

Important documents and reports relating to the distribution of electric power under the statute will be laid before you. At the request of my ministers, the Hon. Dr. Willoughby, Dr. Clark, superintendent of the asylum for the insane, Toronto, and Dr. Ryan, superintendent of the asylum for the insane at Kingston, proceeded, during the recess, to Great Britain and the continent in order to investigate modern methods of caring for and treating the insane. Their very interesting report will be laid before you.

In accordance with my reference to the subject last year, my ministers have considered the question of prison labor, with a view of preventing competition with free labor, and the provincial secretary and other gentlemen proceeded to several of the prisons in the United States, in order to observe the systems in operation there. The result of their visit will be laid before you together with interesting and valuable information obtained by them.

My ministers will propose for your consideration, a scheme of law reform, with a view of decreasing appeals, expediting trials and lessening the cost of litigation. A bill to rearrange the constituencies of the province, in order, as far as possible, to equalize representation. The large increases in the appropriations for the teachers, salaries, additional normal schools, and various other educational purposes, have received the commendation of the public, and you will be asked now to consider increased appropriations for urban schools. The policy of throwing open the publication of text books to public competition has led to considerable reductions in the prices of school reading books, and it is confidently hoped, that reductions in the prices of other books will result from an extension of this policy.

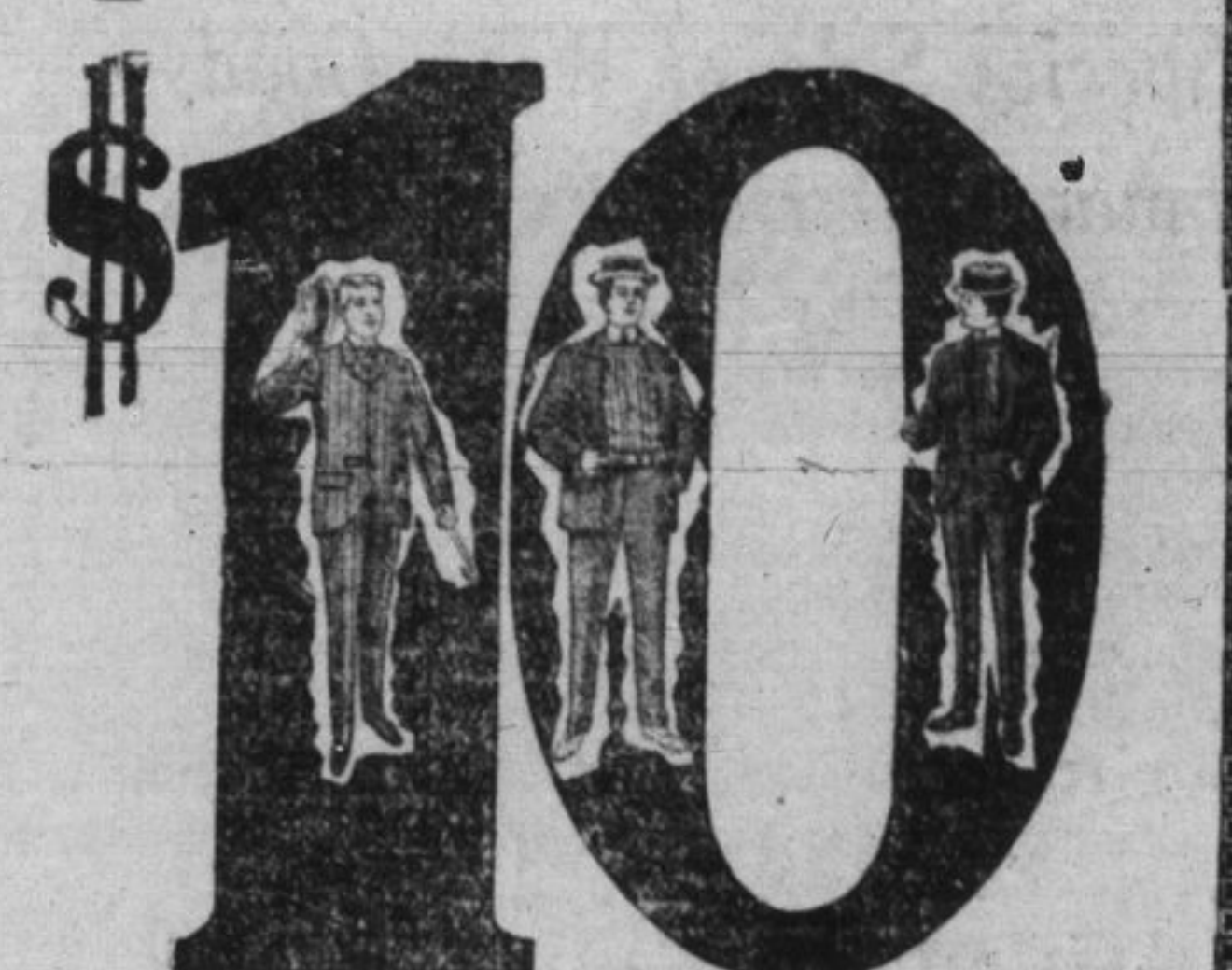
Bills will be laid before you in amendment of various enactments of a public nature, now on the statute books, including the mining laws, the liquor license act, the act relating to the railway and municipal board, the public lands act, the free grants act, the supplementary revenue act and the Ontario shops regulation act. Owing to the steady increase of settlement, it has been found necessary to create the new judicial district of Rainy River.

A conference has been held with the Dominion government with a view to adjusting the differences which have arisen relating to the respective jurisdictions of the Dominion and the province on the subject of railway and other companies, and it is to be hoped that a satisfactory solution will be found. You will be glad to learn that the revenues of the province are largely in excess of the estimates and more than sufficient to meet the public expenditure during the year.

The public accounts will be laid before you for your careful consideration, at the earliest moment, and the estimates for the coming year will also be submitted for your approval at an early day.
