COMPANY'S CLAIM FOR THE LOSS OF COAL DELIVERIES PUT IN.

The Grand Total is Over Two and a Quarter Million Dollars—The Movements of Allan Steamers.

Montreal, Feb. 10.—In an official circular to the shareholders of the Dominion Iron and Steel company, announcing the dismissal of the Dominion Coal company, appears an appeal of the judgment of Justice Longley, upholding the steel company's contention for coal supply. J. H. Plummer, the president, gives a statement of the company's claim as at December 31st, 1907, against the coal company, exclusive of interest. Some \$1,251,533.39 is charged for extra cost of coal purchased from the Dominion Coal company and extra coal purchased from other sources is \$402,721.43. Damages due to short deliveries in August, September and October, 1906, are placed at \$1,222,252.75, and damages due to cessation of deliveries in November, 1906, are estimated at \$479,000, making a grand total claimed of \$2,251,209.57.

The Allan line steamer Sardinian, from St. John and Halifax, for Havre and London, sailed from Halifax on the 8th of February, with five steerage passengers for London, and two second cabin, and two steerage passengers for Havre. The Allan line royal mail steamer Grampian, from St. John and Halifax, arrived at Liverpool, on 9th.

Rose Solomon, the six-year-old girl, who was dreadfully burned on Saturday, by setting fire to her clothes with a candle, died, to-day, in the general hospital.

At the Indian village of Caughnawaga, near here, a celebration took place last week in honor of the sixty-first anniversary of the marriage of an Indian couple named Iohakio. The man is eighty-one years of age and his bride of sixty-two summers is seventy-six.

THE LATE MRS. MC GUIRE.

This Venerable Lady Was Ninety-Eight Years of Age.

There occurred in the city, on Sunday evening, the death of a very old resident, probably the oldest in the city. Mrs. Mary McGuire, relic of the late James McGuire, passed away at the ripe old age of ninety-eight years, satisfied with the rights of the church of which she was a faithful and consistent member. She was a strict adherent of the Roman Catholic church and a member of St. Mary's congregation. She leaves three of a family: Philip, of Alpena, Mich., and Thomas H., Mrs. Murphy, of this city. Mrs. McGuire was born at McGuire's Bridge, county Fermanagh, Ireland, and came to this country about seventy years ago, to Kingston, where she has continually resided since. The late Anthony McGuire, so well and favorably known during life, was the third oldest of the family. The funeral will leave her late residence, Williamson, at nine o'clock Tuesday morning, for St. Mary's cathedral, where a requiem mass will be sung for the repose of her soul.
