New York, Feb. 17.—The Sun has received the following cable despatch from Paris: Alarmed at the growth of tea-drinking in France, the consumption having increased 150 per cent in the last twenty-four years, Francis Marr, whose researches into foods and their values entitle him to respect, warns his compatriots against over-indulgence in the five o'clock habit.

RESCUED IN MID-OCEAN.

Capt. Fraser Formerly of Kingston, Concerned.

The many friends of Capt. Fraser, whose family resided in Kingston for several years recently, will be glad to hear of a rescue he and his crew effected in the mid-ocean, 240 miles north-west of Bermuda, on February 10th.

The disabled vessel had been five days drifting at the mercy of the rough sea. The Bermuda coast to the rescue, and, under the direction of Capt. Fraser, its lifeboats were lowered and the crew of the schooner rescued after a thrilling work.

THE RELIGIOUS CENSUS.

A Positive Value in Church Work.

Thomas Yellowless, who is in the city, in the interests of the religious census, made the most of his opportunities, yesterday. In the morning he spoke at the First Baptist church, in the afternoon at Sydenham street and Queen street Sunday schools, and last evening at the First Congregational church.

During the past three years, Mr. Yellowless has directed house-to-house visitations, as the religious census is often called, in most of the larger cities in the province of Ontario, and, therefore, when speaking on the subject he speaks with expert knowledge. In his address, last evening, he made very clear to the congregation, not only the purpose of a religious census, but also its positive value as an aid in church work.

An Anglican clergyman in Stratford, where the census was taken in November last, stated, though he had taken no interest whatever in the census, that after the work had been completed, there came into his possession from the general committee, the names of many persons, strangers to him, who said that their preference was for his church.

This experience of the clergymen in Toronto and Stratford is by no means unusual. It is the common experience of clergymen in every city in which a religious census is taken.

Mr. Yellowless is well able to awaken the enthusiasm of those who have promised to give a helping hand in the work of visitation, and, therefore, no visitor who is short of fail to hear him to-night at the final rally to be held in the Whig hall under the presidency of E. J. B. Pense, at eight o'clock.

Not only can he awaken enthusiasm in this work, but he can impart that knowledge as only the person expert in these matters can.
