

DENY STATEMENTS

BISHOP BRUCHESI MAKES VARIOUS DENIALS.

He Will Only Grant Dispensations When Pope's Regulations Are Agreed to—Death of Judge Burbridge.

Montreal, Feb. 18.—Archbishop Bruchesi denies the report that he is on the way to America from the Vatican withdrawing the power of the bishops to grant dispensations for mixed marriages. He states that it is known to Pope that the bishops understand local conditions best, and are best qualified to deal with the matter. Mr. Bruchesi also denies that it is his intention to refuse all requests for mixed marriage dispensations in future as has been stated, but where requests are granted, he will demand that the parties agree to the recent regulations relating thereto laid down by the pope.

Wheelock Burbridge, judge of the exchequer court, died this morning from cancer. He had been hopelessly ill for a long time and passed away at his residence at six o'clock. The family kept the news of the death of the judge to themselves and little leaked out since his last judgments which he delivered from his death bed some two or three weeks.

ESCAPED LUNATIC CAUGHT.

Wanted in Pontiac, Mich., Arrested at Mitchell.

Stratford, Feb. 18.—On Saturday a man who escaped from a lunatic asylum in Pontiac, Mich., two weeks ago and who has been staying with some relatives near here, went to Mitchell, on Saturday, to look for a position as an "adviser" on one of the printing offices there. Word came to town to have him arrested, and he was taken in charge by County Constable Coppin, who brought him before the justice magistrate for vagrancy. The prisoner was remanded to the county jail till next Thursday. In the meantime Crown Attorney McPherson, of this city, will communicate with the asylum authorities in Pontiac.

VICTIM OF THE REGICIDES.

Mother of Man Killed in Mistake Sees Royalty.

Lisbon, Feb. 18.—The mother of Costa, the man who was killed by the police on February 1st, yesterday, was one of the assassins of King Carlos, was summoned to the palace yesterday. She was received by King Manuel, the Queen Amelie and Dowager Queen Maria Pia, who informed her that hereafter she would take her place under their protection. The woman told her friends and weeping gratefully, kissed the hands of her benefactors.

House of Commons.

Guelph's Water Works.

Guelph, Feb. 18.—The annual statement of the water works commission was presented at a meeting of the city council, which shows that the city cleared in the neighborhood of \$200,000 in this branch of civic utility. The gross earnings were \$26,004.29 and the profit was \$19,183.18, the sum of \$6,107.55 having been expended on capital account. There are 2,142 consumers.

Defence of Hargis.

Lexington, Ky., Feb. 18.—In the defence of Bech Hargis, who, it is expected will be indicted soon for the murder of his father, Judge James Hargis, the expenses of the defence, to the amount of \$50,000, which is the boy's share of his father's large estate. Counsel for young Hargis will claim self-defence asserting that his father chided him and knocked out several teeth before the son fired.

Caused by Rivalry.

Pottsville, Pa., Feb. 18.—Three Croatians were stabbed to death, six other persons, including two Americans, were cut and bruised and forty-five others were taken to jail, last night, as the result of a riot at Dunbar, which is said to have been the outgrowth of rivalry between two boarding-house bosses.

One Miner Killed.

Pottsville, Pa., Feb. 18.—All but one of the twenty-eight miners who were intoxicated, yesterday, in the Midvale colliery, were rescued, but one killed following the accident which entombed the men, and two were injured.

Gen. Fu Hsiang Dead.

Shanghai, Feb. 18.—General Tung Fu Hsiang, who commanded the Chinese forces in the rebellion of 1900, and who was subsequently banished to the border of Mongolia, died on February 10th. The government is confiscating his property, which is considerable, and devoting it to reforms.

Arrangements Made.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 18.—Russian officials are taking the threat of war with Turkey very seriously. Members of the staff will not discuss the situation for publication, but it is not deemed preparations for eventualities have been in progress for some time.

CIRCUS RIDER SPY FOR GENERAL DEWEY.

Woman in Soldier's Garb Sold English Military Secrets to the Enemy.

London, Feb. 18.—Lily White, a circus rider, charged with drunkenness at Bradford, yesterday, told the bench an extraordinary story.

She was the daughter of an army officer, she said. She ran away from home while in her teens and joined Buffalo Bill's show in Massachusetts. She became a crack shot and an expert rider under Col. Cody's tuition.

Later she married an Austrian army officer. She followed him to South Africa and managed, during the war, to secure some secret information respecting the movements of the British army.

She went to the Boer general Dewey, sold him the information, and was engaged as a dispatch runner.

She wore military attire and passed as a man.

Remorse for her treachery overcame her and she deserted the Boers and joined the British army at Middelburg. She went through several battles, she said, and earned special distinction by carrying a wounded soldier part of the way across the river on her horse.

Afterward she became ill with enteric fever and in the hospital her sex was discovered. She then became a nurse, and later, she concluded, she returned home to resume her professional career.

Cattle sold at 4 1/2 to 5c. per pound for prime steers, 3 1/2 to 4 1/2c. for medium, and 2 1/2 to 3 1/2c. for culls. Sheep brought 4 1/2 to 4 1/2c. and lambs, 6c. to 6 1/2c. per pound. Hogs were quoted at 8 1/2 to 9c. Calves brought \$3 to \$10 each, according to size and condition.
