



have a wider aisle than Wonderland. More people could pass the length of our aisle in a given time than would be the case in Wonderland. The bylaw was never intended to covern littie places like the Bijou. The makersof the law had in mind such places as the Grand Opera House, with a capacity running towards the thousands, and their law was practically a reproduction of the by-law governing the theatres of great cities.

"Our entire aisle is forty-five feet long. On a crowded Saturday night, with a crowd at the entrance, using one exit only, and moving very slowlly, the Bijou was emptied in two and seconded by J. L.
