## TALK ON RAILWAYS

**MACLEAN'S RECIPROCAL DEMURRAGE BILL.**

Was Not Advanced, However—Bill to Enlarge Personnel and Power of Railway Commission to Be Introduced.

Ottawa, Feb. 18.—The House confined its undivided attention to railways to-day. W. F. Maclean's reciprocal demurrage bill, let loose the flood gates of criticism, which ended only at 11 p.m. by the debate being adjourned. The member for South York brought his bill up for second reading, but it did not reach the dignity of that estate, as, after hearing arguments on each side, the minister announced that he would shortly bring in a bill to enlarge the personnel and power of the railway commission to enable it to deal with such questions as reciprocal demurrage, which were still in the theoretical class.

Mr. Maclean, in a moderate speech, outlined his measure and the chairman of the railway committee, Hugh Guthrie, put the side of the railways convincingly and tersely, pointing out the efforts they were making to cope with the abnormal business.

There was an avalanche of complaints from the west as to delays in moving freight, and the minister admitted that grievances existed, but the commission was the body to deal with them and not parliament. So there the matter rests for the time being until the minister makes his announcement.

Chester Gillette Must Die.

Albany, N.Y., Feb. 19.—The court of appeals decrees that Chester Gillette, of Cortlandt, must die in the electric chair for the murder of Grace, or "Bibi" Brown, of South Otsieck, Chango county, at Big Moose Lake, in the Adirondacks, on July 11th, 1906. The court affirms the judgment of conviction of murder in the first degree and the sentence of death rendered at the extraordinary term of the supreme court in Herkimer county, held by the order of Governor Higgins.

## Colored Troops Leave Manila.

Washington, Feb. 19.—A cable message was received at the war department from Gen. Wood, commanding the Philippine division, saying that the transport Sherman sailed from Manila on February 15th, for San Francisco, with the 24th regiment of infantry (negroes).

The 24th infantry is under orders to take station at Madison barracks and Fort Ontario, N.Y. The regiment is in command of Col. Ralph B. French, who has just been promoted as a brigadier-general to succeed Gen. Davis, who was retired Monday.
