THE SPORT REVIEW.

Interesting News From the Various Sporting Fields.

Hackenschmidt and Gotch will wrestle for the world's honors at Chicago the first week in April.

Bolt it all down, and the A.A.U.'s decision is a "thumbs down" to the men too fast for our men to be allowed as an amateur.

Toronto Globe: St. Georges had the puck most of the time, but Hiscock's magnificent display, and the useful work of the men in front of him, kept them from scoring time after time when a tally seemed certain.

Con. Heleman, of Toronto, met six Brampton skaters in the mile race at the latter place, and had no trouble in winning by more than a lap. The track was thirteen laps to the mile.

Toronto Globe: St. Georges won the senior championship, six Manager Short, they will jump at the chance to play Varsity for the Canadian amateur honors. It is not probable that Kingston or Stratford would decline the issue were they declared O.H.A. champions.

The Ottawa hockey team has protested to Secretary Emmett Quinn, of the Eastern Canadian Hockey League, against the signing by Wanderers of Barney Holden, of Winnipeg Maple Leafs. Ottawa further stated that they will refuse to go on the ice if Holden plays in Montreal on Wanderers team on the 29th. The time for signing new players by E.C.H.A. clubs expired at 12 o'clock, and it was stated in a statement was filed that Holden had signed with Wanderers. This seemed all right, but it has developed that since signing Holden has played a game with the Maple Leafs, a fact which Ottawa considers has disqualified him in the past.

Ottawa Citizen: If Frank Patrick had followed the advice of the rosters behind him in the Ottawa-Victoria game, "Marty" Walsh would have been a candidate for the operating table. Some of the Victoria supporters kept yelling to Patrick to "chop Walsh's head off." "Marty" has a habit of getting in front of the net when there is a chance for a goal and in Saturday's game he did this dozens of times. Walsh had Robinson so nervous that he couldn't stop a balloon and Patrick and Kenneth also kept busy watching him. Patrick played a clean game throughout, but that he did not cut Walsh was no fault of the "blancherites."

Toronto Mail-Emire: The primary cause of the visitors' failure to go the distance was attributable to the fact that they were without the services of their crack center, Bernier who is laid up with an injured knee. His absence necessitated the playing of their point, Powell, up on the line, a position in which he could not last and of Stacey, who is subject to heart trouble, at point. Both gave out early in the game, and as a result the rest of the team had to do more than their share of the work, a strain they were unable to stand. The loss of Bernier was also felt in other ways. Kingston says that they will leave Bernier in the return game with the Saints, in Kingston, Friday, and that they will more than pull down the St. Georges' lead. Three goals, however, will take a lot of making up, so as things now stand the local club has excellent prospects of meeting Stratford in the finals.

COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going on in the Business Markets.

The profits for 1907 of the Nova Scotia Steel company were \$944,790. Toronto railway earnings the week ended February 15th totalled \$63,632.96, or \$5,692.06 more than in the corresponding week of last year.

The steel department of the Lake Superior corporation during 1907 received in bounties from the dominion government \$556,268. Of this amount \$177,370 was on pig iron and \$378,898 on steel.

A very useful report just issued shows that in 1905 the railway mileage of the world was 307,900. Allowing conservatively for subsequent increase, it is safe to say, that it is now approximately 600,000.

John D. Rockefeller owns approximately 25 per cent. of the stock of the Standard Oil company, so that his participation in the share dividend, declared recently, will be approximately \$3,700,000. Within the six months' period Mr. Rockefeller will have received in dividends from the Standard Oil company about \$6,250,000.

Over 1,000 years ago Switzerland possessed a forest system, and had developed a scientific forestry, by the fifteenth century. As early as Louis XIV. France awoke to the fact that her forests and her life were draining away together. But it was too late. Today she is spending \$31 an acre to reforest her watersheds. The same experience is costing Italy \$20 an acre.
