Synopsis of Canadian North rest

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS. Any even numbered section of Dominon Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more

Application for homestead entry must he made in person by the applicant at a pominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency. Entry by proxy may, however, he made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader. An application for entry or cancellation ponds personally at any sub-agency. tion made personally at any sub-agent's bilice may be wired to the Agent by the Sub-agent, at the expense of the application, and if the land applied for is vacant or receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by

In case of "personation" or fraud the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim or if entry has been granted it will be summarily cancelled.

An application for cancellation must be

made in person. The applicant must be sligible for homestead entry, and only one application for cancellation will be received from an individual until that application has been disposed of.

Where an entry is cancelled subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for cancellation will be en-

Applicant for cancellation must state in what particulars the homesteader is in

A homesteader whose entry is not the subject of cancellation proceedings may subject to the approval of Depart-ment, relinquish it in favor of father mother, son, daughter, brother or sister if eligible, but to no one else, on filing declaration of abandonment.

COAL—Coal mining rights may be seased for a period of tw-mty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 ser acre. Not more than 2,560 acres shall be leased to one individual or company. Poyalty at the rate of five cents per ton sall be QUARTZ—A person eighteen years .4 ge or over, having discovered mineral in lace, may locate a claim 1,500x1,500

The fee for recording a claim is \$5.

At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may spon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per acre.

The patent provides for the payment of a royalty of 2; per cent on the cales.


