With the close of the summer season however, the growing stringency in the money markets of the world began checking the rapid increase in production and equipment, which had been uninterrupted for some time be-fore. The yield of wheat and grain in the Northwest Provinces, and in Ontraio also, showed a falling off as compared with 1906, and although the Atlantic fisheries and coal mines had an exceptionally busy year throughout, with labor in active demand, and though the volume of traffic and the earnings of the railway companies were the largest ever recorded, the output of manufactured goods and of the various metals was less in the closing months of the year than in the corresponding season of 1906. The lumber industry both in British Columbia and in Ontario and the eastern Provinces was also quiet throughout the autumn, with preparations under way for a smaller cut than last year.
