Three hundred people were examined and vaccinated in one day.

ATTITUDE DEFINED

CONSTRUCTION AIMED AT BY THE LIBERAL PARTY.

Let the Majority Rule is Liberal Motto Regarding Local Option—Leader Backed By a United Party.

Toronto, Feb. 26.—In the closing sentences of his speech in the legislature, yesterday, Hon. A. G. MacKay, defied what he considered to be the attitude of a public man. Particularly he addressed himself to the position which he and his colleagues in opposition occupied. The accusation had been made by supporters of the government that opposition speakers had failed to find anything to criticize in the administration of the Whitney regime. Mr. MacKay pointed out that the making of suggestions, the following of which led to the conferring of benefit upon the community, was of far greater importance than mere criticism of accomplished acts. Throughout the government's history level was maintained by the leader of the liberal party, who was making his first speech in the house in that capacity.

"The greatest good for the greatest number" was the policy to which he adhered, and he pledged himself to it. Without dealing with the question of scandals which have formed the greater part of the ammunition of government speakers, he contrasted the constructive policy of liberal governments with the inertia of the present holders of office. He showed how the present prosperous condition of the province were not due to any constructive act initiated by the conservative party. The complimentary congratulations extended towards the provincial treasurer by the mover and seconder of the address on the fact that he anticipated a surplus of half a million were shown to be valueless. The channels through which the increased provincial revenue had flowed were dug by liberals. The estimates placed before the house last year had promised a surplus of \$1,000,000. The government had undertaken no new work, and yet there had been an unexplained drain upon the public purse. On their chosen ground, the agreements entered into with the Montreal River company, Mr. MacKay proved the policy of the late Premier to have been most advantageous to New Ontario than that of the present administration. THEIR DOWN GAUGE.

The Government Will Not Change the Demand.

Toronto, Feb. 26.—Over half a thousand members of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance waited upon Premier Whitney and members of the government, this morning, pressing their views regarding the repeal of the famous three-fifths clause in the local option legislation.

In a somewhat lengthy speech the premier expressed the sympathy the government felt for the temperance movement, but stated that when they had made up their minds as to the right course to be followed neither threats nor anything else would divert them from that course. He even told the deputation that a three-fifths or some similar majority was sometimes required in their own church courts. If the three-fifths clause were to be made a party issue, then, he said, the government threw down the gauntlet of battle. He stated that there was no need to refer to the states for precedent and so forth, since there were plenty such in British legislation.

FITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Cullied From All Over The World.

Roderick Nicholson was burned to death at High Bank, P.E.I. The police estimates in Toronto for the year total \$410,859, an increase of \$32,613.

The Nova Scotians' claim to rank as creditors of the York Loan was refused in Chicago.

The Equitable mine of the Pittsburgh Coal company, at Webster, has resumed work.

Despatches to Calcutta, India, from the frontier say the rebellious natives are likely to yield soon.

Eight more mills of the Vandergriff Steel Works, Vandergriff, Pa., are being placed in operation this week.

The government will send exhibits from the Dominion to the Franco-British exhibition in London free of charge.

British Columbia's appeal against Chief Justice Hunter's decision in the Natal act was dismissed by the full court.

The Home Life association of Canada has appointed Rev. G. R. Tarkenton as superintendent of agencies for the association.

Vice-Admiral Touchard has been officially appointed French ambassador to Russia, in succession to M. Bonaparte, retired.

A syndicate with \$5,000,000 capital has been formed to build the Quebec & Saguenay railway from St. Anne de Beauport to Tadoussac.

A deputation from Berlin and Waterloo waited on the government at Ottawa to advocate a new post office and customs building at Waterloo.

The New York state court of appeals affirmed the judgments of conviction against Gibson, Jackson and Nell in the so-called "Buffalo graveyard" cases.

An armed band raided the railway station at Peshawar, India, to-day, wounded the station master and a watchman, broke open the safe and captured six hundred rupees.

The rolling mill of the Tyler Tube and Pipe company, Washington, Pa., resumed operations on Wednesday. Over 1,000 miners in the Cherry Valley district have resumed work.

The plant of the American Iron and Steel company, Reading, Pa., resumed Tuesday. Its employees are nearly 1,000. The company reports an improvement in the iron trade.

Three persons, a servant girl, the infant child of Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Owens, and a brother of Mrs. Owens, perished Tuesday night in a fire in a store building at Briers, Minn. Mr. and Mrs. Owens were badly burned.

JAPANESE DEPORTED.

Two Men Whose Case Has Occupied Courts.

Vancouver, Feb. 26.—The two Japanese detained in New Westminster under the Natal act, Chief Justice Hunter subsequently deciding the act does not apply to Japanese, have been deported by the Dominion immigration officials under the order in council forbidding any foreign immigrant to enter Canada from any country other than that of his birth.
