

LIGHT AND POWER AT PRESENT TIME.

Low As the Plant Can Stand -Light Committee Gets Some Information From Its Export. The civic light and power committee had a conference, yesterday afternoon, with J. M. Campbell, the city's ex pert, in regard to matters connected with the light plant. Alds. Chown, McCarthy and Elliott were present. Mr. Campbell said that about \$78, 000 of the \$85,000 voted by the extension by-law had been spent to date. It would take probably \$3,000 more to complete the work. That would leave a balance of \$4,000.

During the past year or so, about \$17,000 of extra gas extensions have been made, and paid for out of the earnings of the plant. Ald. Elliott held that these extra additions should be charged to capital account, and that the council should have deben-

The plant was yielding a surples, and also pay ing \$1,000 in taxes, which other cities with light and power plants didn't have to pay. The city had taken over a bankrupt plant, increased its efficiency, and reduced the debentures by \$16,000 so far.
