Not more than 2,560 acres shall be leased to one individual or company. s royalty at the rate of five cents per ton sail be collected on the merchantable com 'tned QUARTZ—A person eighteen years .4 age or over, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1,500x1,500

The fee for recording & claim is \$5. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in Heu thereof. When \$500 has expended or paid, the locator may apon having a survey made, and upon somplying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per acre.




