## TARDY REWARD COMES TO A HERO OF THE INDIAN MUTINY.

A Civilian Who Captured a Town Receives a Pension From King Edward After Being Ignored Fifty Years.

London, March 6.—During the past few days the splendid services of a civilian during the Indian mutiny fifty years ago have been recognized. The India office has informed Mr. J. Churcher that he has been awarded a pension of \$500 per annum, from January 1st, 1908. Mr. Churcher is indebted to the direct intervention of the king, through his majesty's private secretary, Lord Knollys, for this recognition of a romantic deed.

Mr. Churcher, now seventy-six years old, is a tall commanding figure. His tread is still elastic, his manner dignified, and his speech quiet but full of force. Two of his sons are officers in the British army. Two of his brothers were killed in the mutiny.

In July, 1857, when the mutiny was at its height and Agra deluged with blood, J. Russell Colvin, the hapless lieutenant-governor of the united provinces, sent Mr. Churcher, a young civilian, to attempt to restore British authority in Etah. He was to occupy the fort for the British. He planted a green flag on the wall, proclaimed himself a vice-governor of the king of Delhi, and refused admission. That evening, camped in the mango grove near the fort, he heard that twenty Sikhs who had remained with a regiment at Benares were approaching.

Knowing the dare-devil character of these men I sent for their chief and offered him and his men 100 rupees each for a night's work. They agreed. With head ropes and heads in the mango trees, they made storming ladders, which they carried in the dead of night and placed against the walls of the fort. Up they went, and I followed, while my men went round to the gate of the fort. It was a forlorn hope, but it succeeded.

"I remember well, running along the ramparts with a spy, who knew the fort, and one of the Sikhs, looking in the darkness for the rajah. We found him sitting in his room with attendants on either side. He was a fat man and slow to move. Through the glass door we, in the darkness, could see him well.

Taken By Surprise. "My Nika raised his musket and smashed in the door. I rushed in, a pistol in one hand, a sword in the other. The rajahs drew their swords. I threatened to shoot the rajah first and then afterwards, whereupon they fled, and I secured my prisoner.

"Meanwhile, the rajah's soldiers had attempted to fly by the gate of the fort, and later to return. Forty dead in one spot. Next morning the fort was surrounded by the people of the town. I took the rajah to the gate and announced from the wall above that I would hang him on the spot and turn the tea gans, which we captured on the ramparts, upon the town, if they did not disperse."

Thus was Etah taken. For six months, until the end of the mutiny, Mr. Churcher maintained authority, collected revenue, which he sent to the relief of Agra, and kept the trunk road clear of robbers. Wounded and sick he came to England when the mutiny was suppressed. Returning again, he found that a native clerk, whose loyalty he had commended, had been made rajah of Etah, receiving in place of his clerk's salary of seven rupees per month a salary of \$1000.

For nearly half a century following the mutiny Mr. Churcher, who is a barrister, acted as unpaid special magistrate in the United Provinces. He is now living in a quiet flat in West London.

## BURIED IN POTTER'S FIELD.

Body of Young Anarchist Buried at Public Expense. Chicago, Ill., March 7.—The body of Lazarus Averbuch, the young Russian Jew, who tried to take the life of Chicago's chief of police, on Monday, was buried in the potter's field. The assassin's sister, Olga Averbuch, her resources exhausted, gave reluctant consent to interment by the county, and accompanied by friends or relatives, she was taken to Dunning, the site of the county poor farm, and there, by the light of lanterns, placed in the grave that had been prepared for it.

Following her release from custody of the police Averbuch's sister made vain attempts to have her brother's body given burial according to Jewish rites. A number of undertakers were communicated with in her behalf, but all declined to take charge of the body. Appeal was made to several rabbis with like result. Before it was taken from the morgue Miss Averbuch asked and was permitted to have a photograph taken of herself with her arms about the neck of her brother's body. This done, she was led away sobbing, and later, when she recovered her composure, was taken to her home.

## Aylesworth's Amendment Good.

Rideau Stock Farm, March 7.—(To the Editor): I would like to draw attention to a clause in the proposed amendment to the Dominion election act by Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, as something very much to be desired by the counties, as it would place county voters on an equal standing with those of a city. The present law allows city voters to register and to place on the voters' lists up to a few days before an election, while a qualified county voter's name is not on the list which is revised usually sometimes two years before an election, he has no redress whatever. The amendment provides that by taking such that he is legally qualified, an elector may vote even though his name has been omitted from the revised list.—A. E. WELLS.
