TO ASK FOR CHANNEL

On the East Side of Fighting Island.

Detroit, Mich., March 7.—In addition to the Livingstone channel and Lake Erie, through the lower Detroit river to the westward of Bois Blanc, which will be completed in 1911, prominent Canadian vessel owners and others will ask the Dominion government to open a channel on the east side of Fighting Island, to be used entirely by up-bound vessels. This channel would be wholly within Canadian waters. There is plenty of water most of the way and as the channel is absolutely free from rocks, dredging to

good depth would be an easy thing. If the scheme is carried out, all up-bound vessels will use the Canadian channel, and down-bound boats the American, the latter now being used entirely for traffic in both directions.

COMMOTION IS CAUSED

BY DISAPPEARANCE OF SOME MEMOIRS

Of the Kaiser's Tutor and Life-long Confidant—Active Search Made—The Secrets Were Evidently Stolen.

Berlin, March 7.—Confidential papers which contain important state secrets have been stolen from the effects left by the late Privy Councillor Hintz-peter, the tutor and life-long friend of the Kaiser.

The privy councillor was for years the "power behind the throne" in Germany. He possessed the emperor's confidence to the fullest degree, and he was really responsible for the downfall of Prince Bismarck.

Her Hintz-peter was to the emperor what Bismarck, the historian, was to Bismarck, and those two men knew more about the Bismarck controversy than any other persons alive, save the Kaiser and the Chancellor.

In view of his intimate friendship with the emperor and the enormous influence he possessed, the privy councillor's papers are of the highest importance, and their loss has caused an extraordinary sensation. Many significant stories are being circulated regarding the motive for the theft.

The privy councillor took the precaution before his death to destroy many confidential documents, and he decreed by will that other papers, which contain interesting revelations of European secret history during the last three decades, should remain unpublished for at least fifty years.

Some strange clues have been followed by the authorities without success. One clue led the police to the village of Lesse, in Lorraine, and the village of the district court at Delma, near Metz, made out an order for certain buildings at Lesse to be searched; but no trace of the missing papers was found.

A valet formerly in the privy councillor's service was arrested on suspicion of being concerned in the theft, but no evidence could be found against him. He has been released, although still kept under surveillance.

NEWS OF THE WORLD

OCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From all Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

The Bradford council deadlock still continues between the grid and tory aldermen while the city's business is neglected.

The population of Saskatoon, according to the latest census, is 6,250. The increase is nearly nine hundred during the year.

The Windsor Board of Education boosted the salaries of city school employees, giving increases which will add \$5,000 more to the board's pay roll.

Within the past two weeks there have been five post office robberies in Essex county, the last one occurring at Ruthven when a small quantity of cash and some postage stamps were secured.

Fifty-one of the libel actions brought in connection with the newspaper comments made in connection with the trial of Mrs. Perkins, at Cayuga, have been dismissed by consent with-out costs.

The liquor license fees were raised in Havlock on a vote of the people say that in view of the dangerous and disagreeable nature of the work, they want three dollars per day of eight hours, instead of seventeen and one-half cents per hour for a ten-hour day as paid now. They intend to organize a union at once and claim that work in their line is suspended at the Windsor end.

Fought Battle With Axes. Montreal, March 6.—Two brothers, Martel, who are in a lumber camp near St. Faustin, had a terrible battle with axes this morning, and one of them was killed, while the other was severely wounded.

They began drinking on the feast days preceding Lent, and both were under the influence of liquor when the tragedy occurred.

Shot Through Hand. Mount Forest, March 7.—Henry Ar-nott, an Egerton farmer, was shot through the hand, yesterday, by War-den Shand, of Egerton. Chief Cringle, of Mount Forest, who was sent for, placed Shand under arrest. Thomas Ryan, acting bailiff, of Mount Forest, and Mr. Arnot were making a seizure on Shand, and there followed an alter-cation, during which Shand fired the shot.

Pressmen Visit Guelph. Guelph, March 7.—A special C. P. R. train from Toronto, with several hun-dred members of the Canadian Press Association and their ladies, arrived in the city, this morning, at eleven o'clock. The newspaper people, after a reception at the station, were con-veyed to the O.A.C., the wonders of which they are viewing this afternoon.

Bought Mine For \$8,000,000. Chihuahua, Mex., March 7.—The ne-gotiations of Charles M. Schwab and associates to buy the famous Potosi mine in the Santa Eulalia district are closed. The consideration given is \$8,000,000. Schwab's recent visit to England and France had to do with the transaction.
